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Wednesdays II

Spring Semester (Formerly Winter Semester): Wednesdays II programs are held in the Emeriti Lounge on the second floor of Walwood Hall at 2:00 p.m. on the second Wednesday of every month during the Fall and Spring semesters. The public is welcome to attend.

Note: the Council is no longer sending out reminders for each Wednesdays II. Dates for the Spring Semester Wednesdays II are below. Please put these dates on your calendar. The program dates for the Fall 2007 semester and the January 2008 date will be in the July newsletter.

February 14: John Petro (Mathematics): Ghana, the Black Star of Africa. John and Joyce Petro will give a presentation about their travels in Ghana, formerly the Crown Colony of the Gold Coast, highlighting the history, culture, and traditions of this young country.

March: 14: Larry Ziring (Political Science): Pakistan, Islamic State or Secular Republic. The lecture traces the origins and evolution of Pakistan from a secular model with religious appeal, to a secular experience gone wrong, leaving the religious appeal to define and shape the country's political destiny. The lecture will seek to explain how and why Pakistan became the seedbed for contemporary terrorism.

April: 11: Nancy Falk (Comparative Religion): Hindus in Kalamazoo? How many Americans think of Hindus as people who live and work half a globe away? The reality is that, increasingly, we have Hindu neighbors, teachers, doctors, co-workers, and bosses. Even in a city as typically Midwestern and American as Kalamazoo, there are a number of thriving Hindu communities, some made up almost wholly of immigrants from India and others consisting of converts to Hindu spiritual paths. This slide-illustrated talk will introduce several of these local Hindu communities: their origins, aims, and the many creative adaptations they have made to be able to take root and thrive on American soil.

EMERITI COUNCIL FORUM

On October 6, Dr. Howard Wolpe keynoted an afternoon Forum, sponsored by the Emeriti Council, on Achieving Peace in an Embattled World. An appreciative audience of approximately 100 students, faculty, retired faculty, and people from the community attended the Forum and heard Wolpe, Director of the African Program at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars, begin with a talk on how he and several other African and American trainers and conflict resolution experts worked with the Burundi warring faction leaders. Wolpe then did a session simulating one of the exercises done with these leaders where two different versions of the same picture of a women's face were distributed, emphasizing different facial features that lead to divergent impressions of the age and expression of the woman. The point challenged the participants to recognize that the same facts could assume entirely different meanings in the eye of the beholder. The Forum was concluded with a panel addressing the question whether similar collaborative techniques could work in Iraq. Wolpe was joined in that panel by Dr. Emanuel Kamber, both a WMU physicist and a leader of the Abyssinian group in Iraq, and WMU historian Dr. Howard Dooley. The panel was unanimous in its conviction, borne out by subsequent events, that Iraq is a poor candidate for such training at this point. The audience contributed a number of insights in this final session that led to a similar conclusion. The complexity of the discussion left everyone sobered and determined to persevere in such efforts to achieve peace in this embattled world.
