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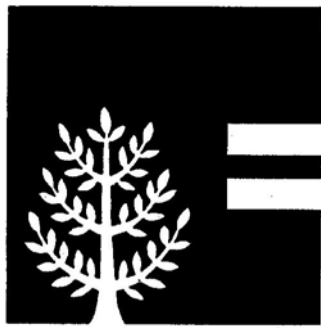

Wednesday, December 12, 2007: Garrard MacLeod (WMUK): Readings for the Holiday For our Holiday Gathering, December 12, the Emeriti and spouses will gather in the lobby of Walwood for special holiday treats, conversation, and Readings for the Holidays, presented by Garrard MacLeod. Selections will include:

Wednesday, January 9: Nancy Falk (Religion): "Hindus in Kalamazoo?" How many Americans think of Hindus as people who live and work half a globe away? The reality is that, increasingly, we have Hindu neighbors, teachers, doctors, co-workers, and bosses. Even in a city as typically Midwestern and American as Kalamazoo, there are a number of thriving Hindu communities, some made up almost wholly of immigrants from India, others converts to Hindu spiritual paths. This slide-illustrated talk will introduce hearers to several of these local Hindu communities: their origins, aims, and the many creative adaptations they have made to be able to take root and thrive on American soil.

Wednesday, Feb.13: James Bosco (Educational Studies): The Kalamazoo Promise: Status and Future. As Western Michigan University's liaison with the Kalamazoo Public Schools, James Bosco work with the KPS administration, teachers, and with the students as they implement their Promise scholarships at Western.

Wednesday, March 12: Ernst Breisach (Distinguished Scholar, History): Why Would an Historian Write a Biography? Dr. Breisach's many scholarly publications include his recent book, On the Future of History: The Postmodernist Challenge and its Aftermath, several well-known publications on Historiography, and the biography, Caterina Sforza: A Renaissance Virago.

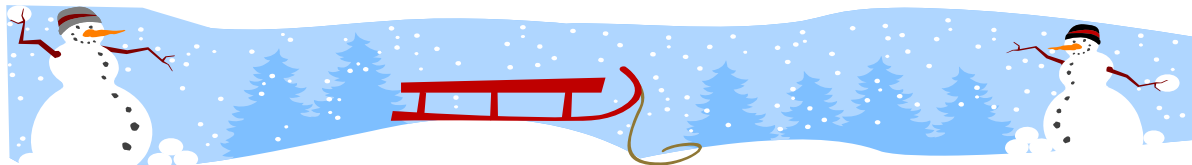

THE COUNCIL'S NEW E-MAIL LIST: Until a few years ago, the Council sent out reminders for each and every event. Doing so required only that we get the information to the Office of the President in time sufficient for them to assemble the workers to do the mailing process. To eliminate the lead time the Council began asking volunteers from the Council to help with the mailing process. We quickly realized why it took so much lead time for the WMU to get our mailings out. We found that a typical mailing took about four people each of two to three hours to do the folding, spindling and mutilating. (In addition, each mailing cost the University about \$240 in postage alone.) That led to a concerted effort to do fewer mailings, so that we now send out two newsletters and try to time the newsletters so as to include the announcements for the next semester's Wednesdays II and at least the dates for upcoming on- and off- campus events, but we no longer send out reminders. This procedure also does not allow us to notify you of

events that have become known only since the last newsletter or cancellations or changes in dates. The Council has had considerable discussion about how much more efficient it would be if we could assemble an email list for this purpose. With Nancy Falk doing much of the organizing, the Council has finally assembled an email list of about half of the emeriti and is now sending reminders and updates out electronically to those of you for whom we have an email address. If you have not received any of these reminders and would like to get them, send an email to Nancy Falk (nancy.falk@wmich.edu) so that she can make sure you are on our email list.
