Session Descriptions:

*Opening Session

“What is the Assessment Climate at WMU?” and “Dave Reinhold’s Top Ten List for Assessment”

Presenters – Allison Kelaher-Young and David Reinhold

In this opening session, we will be discussing as a community our collective thoughts on assessment of student learning. What do we know about assessment? How can we learn more about assessment? And what are some key ideas that might be a good place to start when talking about assessment.

*Break Out Session I

A) “Appreciating the “A” Word – Putting a Plan in Action: Non-degree awarding units”

Presenters – Brad Dennis, Laura Darrah and Maira Bundza

Non-degree awarding units are actively engaged in assessments like surveys, focus groups and individual conversations. Framing those in an assessment plan is a chance to add intentionality to the process. A plan provides guidance, connects assessment to your goals, identifies missing areas, and outlines how the results will be used and more. Join us to see two different approaches to starting a plan and have some in-session work time to draft something to take back to your department. Examples of each approach will be shared.

B) “Assessment for Improvement - Closing the Loop: Degree awarding units”

Presenters – Katharine Cummings, Joni Jones, Cheryl Lyon-Jenness and Kim Searing

Join the WMU Bronson School of Nursing and the History Department in this session where they will share an overview of their assessment efforts and lessons learned. The importance of using assessment results to make changes to classes, programs and curriculum will be the focus. Having a plan and collecting the data is a great beginning, but using the results of your assessments is the key to making the assessment useful.

*Break Out Session II

A) “Extreme Makeover: Assessment Plans Edition”

In this hands on work group session, an overview of how to write a simple but effective assessment plan will be provided. Examples will be shown and time will be built in to the session to work on writing outcome statements and to answer specific questions.

B) “Tool Time: Assessment Tools”

In this hands on work group session, we will show you some samples of exemplary rubrics and provide you with the basics for how to create your own rubric. Time will be spent working on providing suggestions to those who brought in rubrics for feedback as well as time to work on creating a rubric from scratch with the assistance of the facilitator(s) if requested.

“Creating Clear Pathways: Assessing and Enhancing the First Year Experience at WMU”

First-year student success is no accident. Student engagement in a variety of intentionally designed educationally-purposeful activities is necessary to achieve desirable learning outcomes. A common feature of institutions with strong undergraduate programs is the creation of clear pathways for student success via enrollment materials, supportive resources, rituals, and in-and-out of class experiences that heighten students’ commitment to academic success. This presentation will highlight these practices and their implications for promoting student success. We will also consider WMU's results from the National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE) as a tool for reflecting on practices related to first year student achievement and how these data and other campus assessment results can guide the development and improvement of the first year experience.

***Session III**

“University Support for Assessment: 2009-10 Assessment Fellows’ Projects”
