Deidre Lynch (Harvard University)



Dr. Deidre Lynch is currently Professor of English at Harvard University. She is the author of *The Economy of Character: Novels, Market Culture, and the Business of Inner Meaning* (Chicago UP, 1998), which won the MLA Prize for a First Book; two edited collections, *Janeites: Austen's Disciples and Devotees* (Princeton UP, 2000) and (with William Warner) *Cultural Institutions of the Novel* (Duke UP, 1996); and most recently, the critically acclaimed *Loving Literature: A Cultural History* (Chicago UP, 2015). Lynch is also a co-editor of the Norton Anthology of English Literature and is the recipient of fellowships from the National Humanities Center and the John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation, as well as the State University of New York Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Teaching and the Northeast Association of Graduate Schools' Graduate Faculty Teaching Award.
