Dr. Admasu Tsegaye, president and associate professor of Addis Ababa University since March 2011, is currently serving as a Fulbright Scholar at Oklahoma State University. His research and journal articles focus on various aspects of biodiversity, genetic diversity and physiology of indigenous crops.

An internationally recognized expert on African crop ecology and resource conservation, Dr. Admasu has also served in several international higher education and research positions. He has published extensively in distinguished international journals, including “Field Crops Research,” the “Journal of Agronomy,” and “Crop Science” and he is currently associate editor of the “Netherlands Journal of Agricultural Science.”

Dr. Admasu has traveled extensively and has participated in research and partnership visits to a number of universities, including Kent University, Oxford University, and Bern University. He holds master’s and Ph.D. degrees in crop ecology and resource conservation from Wageningen University in the Netherlands.
