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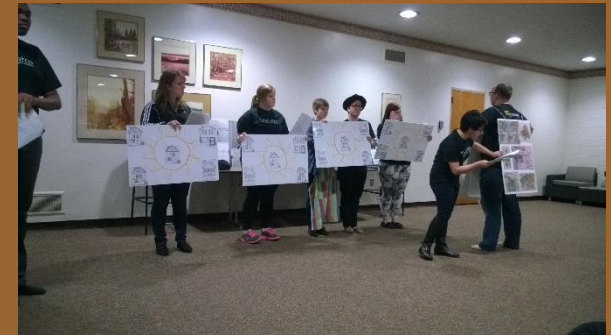
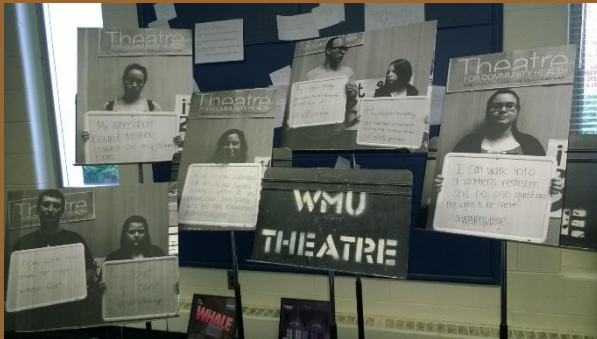


Everyone Counts Diversity Learning Community 2013 -14 Race, Privilege, and Power
