Theodore M. "Ted" Vestal, (Ph.D., Stanford) is professor emeritus of political science at Oklahoma State University and author of "The Lion of Judah in the New World: Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia and the Shaping of Americans' Attitudes toward Africa" (Preager Publishing, 2011). In 1964-66 he served as a Peace Corps executive in Ethiopia and has maintained an academic interest in the country and its people ever since. His book, "Ethiopia: A Post-Cold War African State," was published in 1999" (Preager Publishing). Vestal has served as an expert witness in over 115 political asylum cases of Ethiopians and Eritreans since 1996.
