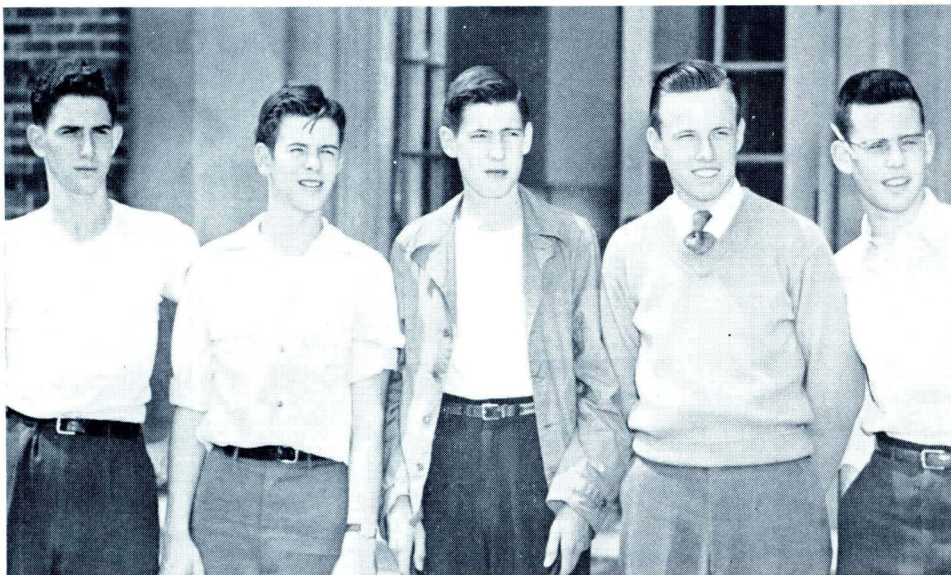
TRACK

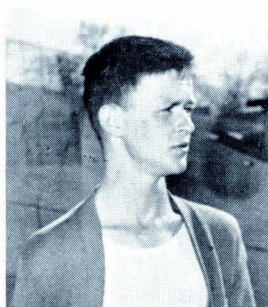
