BASKETBALL

After losing to Niles, the Cubs came back strong by trouncing Three Rivers and nosing out St. Joseph, Sturgis, and South Haven.

The last part of the season found the Cubs at the short end of the Holland Christian, Dowagiac, Niles, Sturgis and St. Joseph games. Three Rivers was the only Cub win of the last five games of the season.

In the Regionals the cagers came back to their old form to turn back Coldwater. In the finals of the Regionals the Cubs were edged out by Sturgis by a 36-34 score, but even when going down to defeat the Cubs played good basketball.

Individual honors for the basketball team should go to Bill Perrin. Bill was elected captain by his team-mates and was also placed on the all-city basketball team at center.

Other players deserving a good deal of credit are, Harold Upjohn, high-scoring soph forward, Harry Parker, first string forward, David Auxter, guard, Jim Ralston, soph guard, Mark Thompson, sub guard, and Bob Espie, sub forward.

Returning lettermen for next season are Harold Upjohn, Jim Ralston, David Auxter, Dick Barnes, Dave Ritsema and a host of promising reserves. With material like this to build from, next year's team should really go places.



TRACK




NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY



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
