Professional Society Activities

International Journal of Comparative and Applied Criminal Justice: PAUL FRIDAY was appointed to the advisory board. Paul has also been appointed to the U.S. delegation to participate in the "International Symposium of Young Penalists," sponsored by the International Association of Penal Law.

American Society of Criminology: PAUL FRIDAY was reappointed chair of the International Liaison Committee. Paul also chaired a session at the 1976 annual meeting in Tucson. The following faculty received research grants from outside the university during 1976.

ELLEN ROBIN received a grant from the Administration on Aging in HEW which provides funds for 20 one-semester undergraduate assistantships, a speaker-consultant series, a secretary, and released time for the director.

Work is in progress on a contract from the Michigan Office of Substance Abuse Services for an "Evaluation of Pilot Projects and Recommendations for Implementation of P.A. 339" (decriminalization of public intoxication). Those working on the project include: SUBHASH SONNAD (Principal Investigator); graduate students, GREG BLEVINS, KEN MILLER, DENISE KABAT, DORIS CUBBERNUSS and STEVE KONING; and undergraduates SUSAN CARINGELLA and BETH HARRISON.

A contract was recently received from the Riverwood Community Health Center, St. Joseph, Michigan for an "Evaluation of Riverwood Preschool Treatment Program." The project staff includes SUBHASH SONNAD (Director), PAUL PETRO, JACK HALTEMAN, and SANDY VAN ANTWERP.

PAUL FRIDAY received a grant from the Swedish Crime Prevention Board for an "Assessment of Alternative Sanctioning Policies." The project is designed to look at the impact of the day-fine system in Sweden.

PAUL FRIDAY is director of an "Evaluation of the Deferred Prosecution Program" which is a follow-up study of his 1973 study and funded by the Citizens Probation Authority, County of Kalamazoo.

PAUL FRIDAY is director on "International Assessment of the Critical Issues in Adult Probation Services." This research is being funded by OCJP through a subcontract from the Ohio State University Research Foundation. It involves an evaluation of all probation studies throughout the world.

STAN ROBIN and JIM BOSCO are continuing research on the social context of stimulant drug therapy for the treatment of hyperkinetic children. Their research was funded for May, 1976 through December 1977 by NIMH and the Office of Education. Stan and Jim have applied to NIMH for additional funding to continue the research beyond next December.

DICK MAC DONALD and JIM SCHELLENBERG are completing their analysis of a survey on faculty attitudes toward unionization at Western last year. Dick is also working in the area of High Risk Life Styles.

Readings in Social Problems: JERRY MANIS had an article, "The Seriousness of Social Problems," in the 1976-77 annual edition published by the Duskin Publishing Group. The new paradigm of social problems suggested by Jerry in his recent book and articles has begun to receive some attention by other sociologists. For the most part, thus far, the response has been of the "for another point of view see" (e.g., Merton and Nisbett's 1976 edition of their Social Problems text). However, there have been several more notable consequences. Henslin and Roesti, Social Problems (October, 1976) pp. 66 has suggested that the SSSP adopt the Manis criteria of the seriousness of social problems. And, the 1977 edition of Scarpitti's Social Problems (p. 6) has used Manis' definition of a social problem, while dropping and criticizing his earlier edition's definition based on the "public opinion" criteria.
