Professional Associations and Journal Activities

MORT WAGENFELD was elected secretary of the Mental Health Section, American Public Health Association for 1977-78.

JIM PETERSEN was elected treasurer of the Association of Voluntary Action Scholars.

PAUL FRIDAY visited Budapest, Athens, and Istanbul in July for the collection of data for research on the use of probation and to establish liaison for the American Society of Criminology. Paul was recently reappointed to the chairmanship of the International Liaison Committee of the <u>American Society of Criminology</u> and in December was elected to its executive board. He was its vice president in 1975 and has served two prior terms on the board. Paul has also been appointed program organizer for the International Symposium on Comparative Criminology, August 11-12, 1978 in Warsaw, Poland and as co-chair for the program sessions of the Research Committee for the Study of Deviance and Social Control at the World Congress of Sociology, Uppsala, Sweden August 14-19, 1978. Both programs are functions of the <u>International Socielogical Association</u>. He is the U. S. representative to the <u>International Society for Criminology in Paris</u>.

HERB SMITH was nominated by the <u>ASA</u> to represent the Michigan region, to provide a critical review of a six-year project, sponsored by National Center for Educational Statistics and directed by staff at Miami Ohio University. The volume to be produced is to provide school districts with vital resources for developing and enriching their educational programs. He will spend two days in Chicago in March, 1978, on this project.

EDSEL ERICKSON has an even heavier schedule than usual as the 1978 <u>ASA</u> meeting chair for all of the sociology of education panels and roundtables. In April, he will be speaking at Northern Colorado on "The Development of Applied Research Institutes in Universities," as well as attending the March meeting of the <u>Council of Exceptional</u> <u>Children</u>. He also made a presentation to the Social Services and Volunteer Agencies in this area on child abuse.

In February PAUL HORTON announced his decision to retire at the end of the 1977-78 academic year. Paul joined Western's sociology department in 1943. His first book, <u>The Sociology of Social Problems</u> with Gerald Leslie (Appleton, Century Crofts) was published in 1955 and has just reached its sixth revised edition. Since then, in collaboration with CHET HUNT, he has authored <u>Sociology</u> (McGraw Hill) in 1964, revised in 1968 and 1972. He has also published <u>Sociology</u> and the <u>Health Services</u>, 1965; <u>Studies in the Sociology of Social Problems</u>, 1971; and, with Bob Horton (WMU, Ph.D. 1973), <u>Programmed Learning Aid in Introductory</u> <u>Sociology</u>, 1971, and <u>Basic Principles of the Social Sciences</u>, 1972.

Some of his books have been translated into Spanish, Portuguese and Japanese. The Horton-Hunt <u>Sociology</u> text (the fifth edition is in preparation) has been published in a special international student edition by McGraw Hill. Our recent visitor from the University of London, John MacDonald, observed that it was the only U. S. basic sociology text carried in the London School of Economics book store.

Western's <u>Gerontology Program</u>, developed and chaired by ELLEN ROBIN, has been refunded by the <u>Office of Aging</u>, <u>HEW</u>, at a higher level for two additional years. Supporting her position in this rapidly growing on-campus program, Ellen continues in the following related local activities: President, Senior Services of Kalamazoo; Member, Southwestern Michigan Commission on Aging; Chair, Kalamazoo County Commission on Aging.

STAN ROBIN has been elected to the Board of the <u>Kalamazoo Child</u> <u>Guidance</u> <u>Center</u>. He has also been elected chair of the University's <u>Research</u> <u>Policies</u> <u>Council</u>.

MORT WAGENFELD has been appointed to the <u>Kalamazoo</u> <u>Community</u> <u>Mental</u> <u>Health Services</u> <u>Board</u> for three years, 1978-81.

PAUL FRIDAY, as director of our Criminal Justice Program, is a member of the Kalamazoo Area Criminal Justice Programs Advisory Board, which works with the Criminal Justice Programs at Western, KVCC and Nazareth.

As chair of the departmental committee to review the graduate program, LEW WALKER, with the other committee members -- CHET HUNT, DAVE LEWIS, AND JERRY MANIS -- completed the Blue Ribbon Committee Report which contains a number of recommendations for improving our graduate program.

TOM HOOD joined us this winter to teach courses in social psychology, especially one on Goffman's Ethnomethodology which has been a long-standing interest of Tom's.
