



CHHS Awards as % of WMU Awards by Year




Number of Awards and Awardees Summary

• 2017:

- Highest award value represented by any one college for second consecutive year
- CHHS has 13% of WMU's T/TT faculty
- Award value is 62% of value of submissions
- Number of awards and awardees trending in positive direction
- College has sustained external funding efforts over many years with relatively few awardees
- For 2017, 18% of faculty received awards (21 total awardees), reflecting an increase from last year



CHHS Research Support

- Junior Faculty Discovery Initiative

 - Funds to be used for release time (replacement cost) for teaching load

 - Priorities for funding focused on grant writing support
- Writing and proposal development assistance
 - Research Office Hours in spring 2018
- FRACAA development: current AY CHHS faculty received 3 of 21 awards in comparison to none in the prior 2 years

Conclusions

- Trends:
 - Proposal activity for FY18 is strong, with \$4.725 million in proposal requests submitted to-date; greater than our highest year
 - Value of awards is less than last year
 - Our expenditure value is on par with last year at this time
- Overall proposal success rate remains high
- We appear to be maintaining our funding levels as sources and faculty change from year to year
