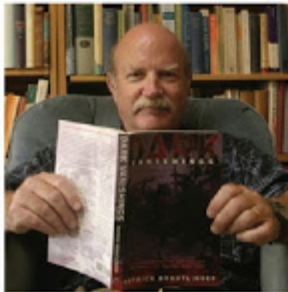

Patrick Brantlinger is James Rudy Professor of English (Emeritus) at Indiana University. His many influential works include *Rule of Darkness: British Literature and Imperialism, 1830-1900* (Cornell, 1988), *Crusoe's Footprints: Cultural Studies in Britain and America* (Routledge, 1990), *Who Killed Shakespeare? What's Happened to English Since the Radical Sixties* (Routledge, 2000), *Dark Vanishings: Discourse on the Extinction of Primitive Races, 1800-1930* (Cornell, 2003) *Taming Cannibals: Race and the Victorians* (Cornell, 2011), and most recently, *States of Emergency: Essays in Culture and Politics* (Indiana, 2013).
