Over and Over

"Say, Mister, what's going on?"

"You a stranger here? Haven't you heard about the man who has been preaching equal rights for blacks and inciting the natives? He was convicted of leading the plot to kill the prime minister and they've taken him away to be executed. It was in all the papers, how he was saying them blacks had the right to live outside the compounds and ride the buses with us people and to go to school with our kids. Why everybody knows they're no better than animals. We can't let them get the upperhand or we're all 'goners.'

"Where was I? Oh yeah, anyway this guy is going around to all the villages, see, and telling stories and healing sick people and they say even casting out devils, but you can't believe nothing like that. Anyway, he gets this band of twelve men and they travel around in the provinces and get these blacks all stirred up, thinking they're as good as us or something. He calls our congress a bunch of hypocrites, the nerve of the guy, and preaches some baloney about his kingdom coming. He goes around wearing white clothes and he don't do no work. Seems he expects that people will give him food and they do, too, by golly!

"Well, about a week ago he comes here to the capital with his crowd, see? I heard he sent one of the men into the city ahead of him to get a car. Well, this follower of his gets this jeep from some nut and the leader parades into the city. He goes through the black section and the natives go wild. They wave branches and throw flowers and sing. This guy has the nerve to come to the assembly where the prime minister is speaking and one of the followers takes a gun, runs up to the prime minister, and shoots at the old guy. Well, everyone is shouting and trying to get out of the way and a troop of policemen comes up to this band and captures the leader. The rest get away.

"Those police who capture this guy see that the others in his gang are lost in the crowd so they hurry him off to jail. They have this questioning time and they aren't too gentle, see? Somebody gets a bull whip and they try it out on the guy. Well, they take him to the court building a couple days later and the guy's insane! He keeps talking about his father. Gee, he must have cracked up! As the guards take him into the court, the mob shouts and throws stones at him and rushes forward to get him. Everyone is yelling, 'Kill him! Kill him.'

"Inside the court this guy won't talk. The prosecutor asks him questions and he doesn't open his mouth; the judge gets mad and finds him in contempt of court. "Well, that's the low-down. He was condemned to be shot about half an hour ago. I was there and you know, he said the strangest thing, almost as if he was talking to someone, 'How many times must I die before they know me? Forgive them again, Father, for they still know not what they do.'

The National Council of Teachers of English for the past four years has sponsored a contest in competitive writing for high school juniors. The value of the program lies in the high recommendations for scholarships given to winners, not in the actual receiving of scholarships.

The contest requires students to write an impromptu essay and to take objective usage and literary interpretation tests.

In preparation for the final selection, each junior wrote an extemporaneous essay. English teachers, Miss Bernyce Cleveland and Miss Beth Giedeman, selected those essays most suitable for competition. Writers of these then turned in a theme of their choice, written earlier in the year, and all entries were judged by a local committee.

'U' High is permitted to enter only one contestant, according to the regulation pertaining to school size. This talented junior is Judith Larzelere, chosen on the basis of the quality displayed in the two essays. She is now eligible for state competition.

'U' High entrants from previous years include William Whitbeck, Alice Terry, and Beth Fox. With his superb writing ability, Whitbeck was a state finalist.
