

# St. Joe Bears To Meet Cubs

St. Joe comes to Kalamazoo Friday evening for a tussle with our Cub Cageteers. The Bears already hold a lop sided 66-31 decision over our five. That game was played a month ago over in St. Joe. Since then the Cubs have improved steadily and hope to put up a good battle on their own floor.

St. Joe is battling for the conference title. As of this writing they have a 6 won, 2 lost record in Big Seven play. They are tied for second with Three Rivers. A loss would put them out of the running and could sew up the championship for the Niles Vikings.

Our Hilltoppers now have the use of Glen Shugars, sharp shooting guard who became elegible at the semester. He is a good shot and an excellnt floor man. He will probably team with Sutton, Gill, Mindeman, and Hubbell on the starting team Friday. St. Joe will rely on High scoring Paul Weber and Fred Clarke to lead their attack.

In the first eleven games this season the Cubs have won three and lost eight. They have scored 370 points for a 33 point per game average. Their opponents have racked up 501 points for an average of 45 points a game.

Next week the Stevensmen finish off the regular season at Three Rivers against the Wildcats. These boys also smell the Big Seven Championship and will be out for blood. They beat us 58 to 36 in a game played here last month. After this encounter our team turns to the State Tourney. We are in the Plainwell district this year along with Allegan, South Haven, and Otsego.

#### State Hi Enters Plainwell District in State Tourney

The hilltop basketball team is going to enter a different district for the annual tournament this year. Allegan, Otsego, South Haven, and State High will be the four teams in the district. The drawings will be made at a later date.

Previously the Cubs played in a district with such strong teams as Sturgis, Three Rivers, and Coldwater. The new setup will make the possibilities there to win the district title. Last year, our quintet coached by Al Bush, lost a one-point heartbreaker to Sturgis 36-35 overtime in the first round. If the Cubs win the district meet, they will be entered into the Regional tournament, etc.

This year's district meet will be held in the new Plainwell gymnasium with a seating capacity of about fifteen hundred.
