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It has been another wonderful year for *The Open Journal of Occupational Therapy* (OJOT). In the words of Walt Disney, “We keep moving forward, opening new doors, and doing new things, because we're curious, and curiosity keeps leading us down new paths” (<https://www.goodreads.com/quotes/656385>). In the last year, we celebrated reaching the milestone of over 300,000 full-text downloads, expanded our international exchange, and planned the future directions of the journal.

As we celebrate the continued expanding readership of OJOT, I would like to acknowledge the top 10 most downloaded OJOT articles (see Table 1). These articles demonstrate the diversity of topics and research that OJOT publishes. They include the following in order of the number of downloads.

Readership

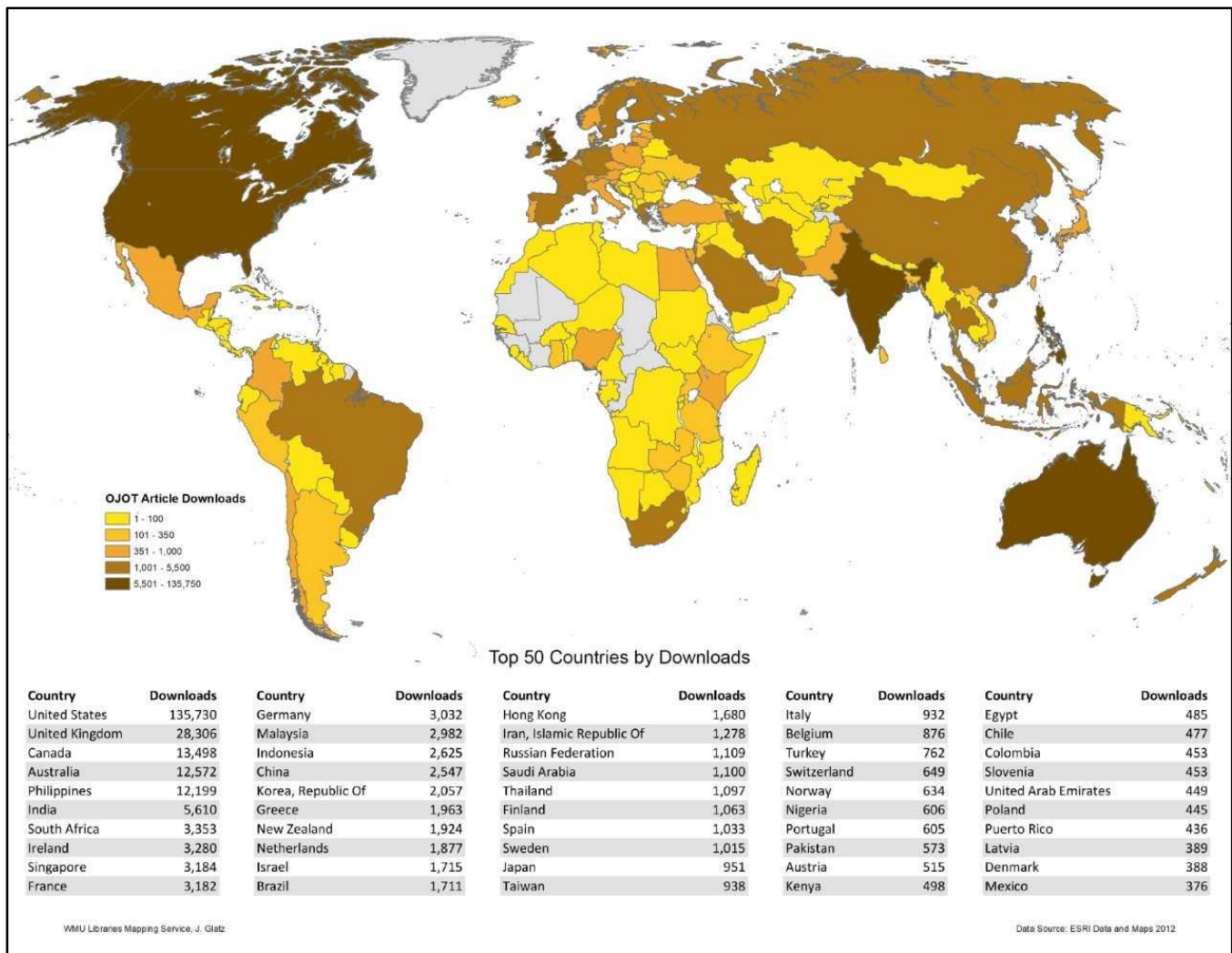


Figure 1. World map of OJOT downloads.

Readers from all over the world are accessing OJOT articles. Full-text articles have been downloaded 327,647 times in 196 countries. The top 10 countries for downloads are the United States, the United Kingdom, Canada, Australia, the Philippines, India, South Africa, Ireland, Singapore, and France, in that order. See Figure 1 for the distribution of world readership.

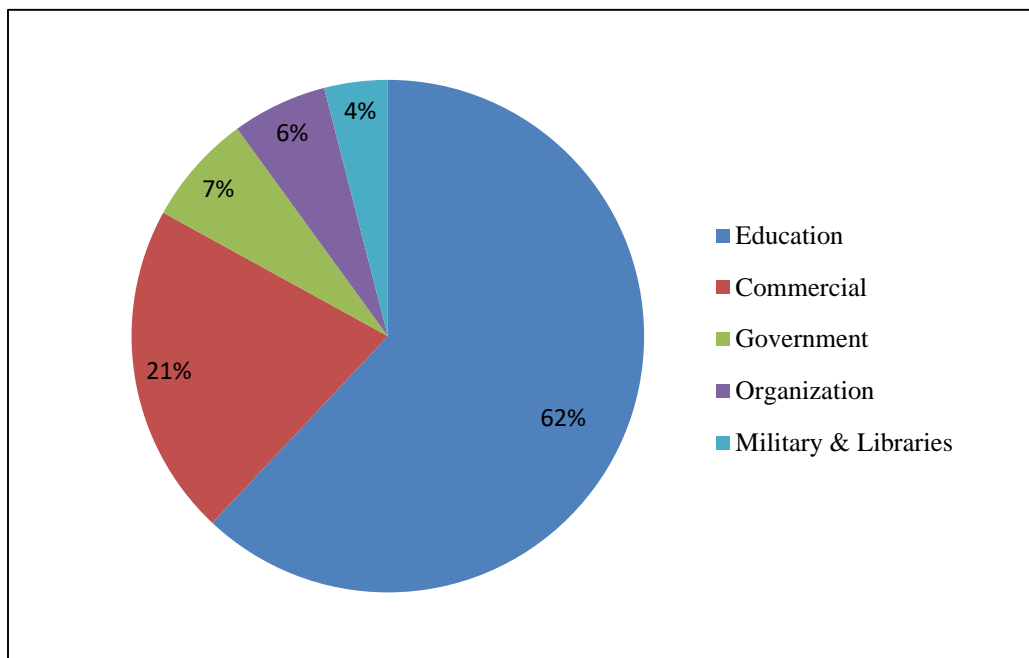


Figure 2. Downloads of OJOT articles by institution type.

A total of 10,795 institutions have downloaded full-text articles from OJOT. The most common type of institution to download articles from our site is educational institutions, followed by commercial, government, organization, and military and libraries. See Figure 2 for the distribution by institution

The means of accessing OJOT articles also varies, with 5,547 online referrers. Six of the top 10 referrers are google sites (www.google.com, www.google.com/url, www.google.co.uk, www.google.ca, www.google.com.au, and www.google.com.ph), followed by two Scholarworks links, and one link each by Bing and Facebook.

Spreading the Word about OJOT

We have worked diligently to spread the word about OJOT and to develop our international exchange. In the last year, we had a presence at three conferences. In April, we once again had an informative booth at the 2018 American Occupational Therapy Association Annual Conference and Exposition in Salt Lake City, Utah. In May, I presented a poster at the 2018 World Federation of Occupational Therapists Congress in Cape Town, South Africa. At this conference, I exchanged ideas with occupational therapy colleagues from around the world, and I also had the opportunity to connect with occupational therapists from Belgium, who invited me to be a keynote speaker at their September 2018 research conference, titled Occupational Therapy Research Symposium: Creating Connections—Building Bridges, in Lueven, Belgium. At this symposium, I presented a keynote address, titled “Publishing OT Research: Challenges and Opportunities,” and a workshop, titled “Tips for Successful Scholarly Publication”. I also discussed research ideas with other international presenters and listened to research presentations from several doctoral students who are up-and-coming researchers in the profession of occupational therapy.

Future Directions

To continue to expand our international exchange, OJOT will feature a special section in the Summer 2019 issue focused on international occupational therapy. Dr. Suzanne Martin, Head of the School of Health Sciences at Ulster University in Ireland, will serve as the section guest editor. The section will include articles from and about occupational therapy practice and education in countries from around the globe.

As always, we appreciate all of the support we receive from the OJOT sponsors, board members, reviewers, and readers. We look forward to receiving your submissions and your feedback about how to improve the content and quality of the articles to bolster the scholarly exchange among occupational therapists. And, finally, we plan to continue to provide open access to clinical solutions and educational resources that support the profession of occupational therapy.
