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## State makes cuts in funds for construction and maintenance

University officials have been informed by the Michigan Legislature and the Michigan Department of Management and Budget of current fiscal year negative supplemental appropriation reductions of \$1,595,000 for new construction projects and \$1,514,279 for special maintenance and remodeling projects on campus.

They include new construction funding deferrals of \$871,000 for the building to house the Haworth College of Business and \$724,000 for the Waldo Library addition. The special maintenance and remodeling projects are: roof replacements for the aviation building, the Fetzer Center and Wood Hall; roof repairs for the Sindecuse Health Center; window replacement for the physical plant; and the upgrading of nine chilled water systems.

"This negative supplemental appropriations bill for most departments of state government does not affect our general operating fund, but it represents a severe cut in construction and maintenance funds for our institution," said Keith A. Pretty, WMU general counsel and vice president for legislative affairs.

"Presently, there is no provision for restoration of the special maintenance and remodeling funds, although I have been told by legislative leaders that every effort will be made to restore these funds in the 1990-91 fiscal year," Pretty reported. "The cuts for our Waldo Library and business building are deferrals; we're hopeful that these funds will be restored early in the state's new fiscal year that begins Oct. 1."

## Welcome home reception planned for Sunseeker solar car team

A public reception to welcome home the race team for Sunseeker, the solar-powered vehicle designed and built by students and faculty members at WMU and Jordan College, is set for 3 p.m. Friday, July 20, in the Miller Auditorium parking lot.

The team will be returning to campus after participating in the 1,800-mile Sunrayce USA from Orlando, Fla., to Warren, Mich. The race, sponsored by General Motors, began July 9 and ends July 19 at the GM Technical Center. Thirty-two teams from colleges and universities in North America were invited to compete after more than 60 institutions submitted proposals.

On Friday, the WMU/Jordan College team will trailer the vehicle from Warren to the parking lot near the K-Mart on Stadium Drive in Kalamazoo. Then the vehicle will be unloaded and make its way with a police escort down Stadium Drive to Howard Street and into the Miller Auditorium parking lot.

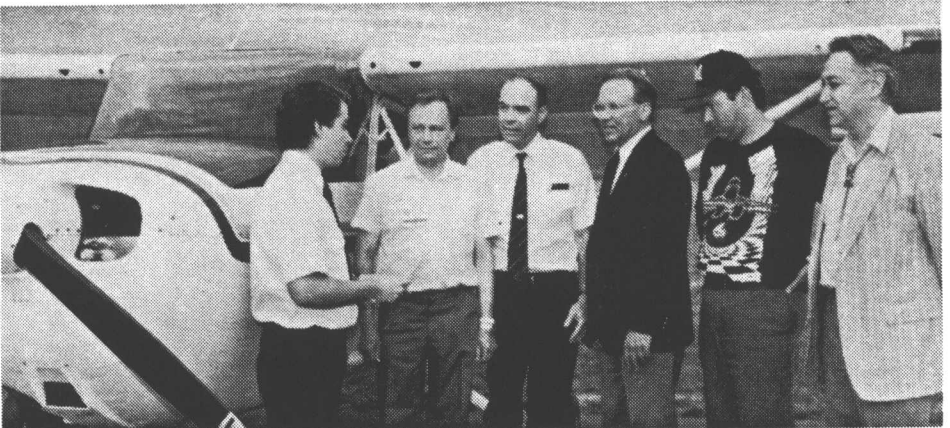
## Board approves promotions of 36 faculty members

## Clarke selected to serve as provost during search

A. Bruce Clarke has been selected to serve as the University's chief academic officer during the search for a replacement for George M. Dennison.

President Haenicke plans to recommend the appointment of Clarke as provost and vice president for academic affairs, effective Aug. 1, to the Board of Trustees at its July 27 meeting. Dennison, WMU's provost since 1987, is leaving to become president of the University of Montana. Clarke's position is a term appointment and will end at the time a new provost is named.

"Dr. Clarke is an obvious choice for this position," Haenicke said. "He has a successful record of administrative experience; he knows the operation of the academic affairs office well; and he enjoys the trust of his colleagues. I am grateful to him for accepting the position and the considerable challenge it entails."

Clarke has been associate vice president for academic affairs for the last two years and was dean of the College of Arts and Sciences from 1978 to 1988. He joined the WMU faculty in 1967 as professor and chairperson of the Department of Mathematics,

the position he held until becoming dean. Between 1951 and 1967, he was a faculty member at the University of Michigan.

Haenicke has begun the search process for a new provost and has enlisted the services of a Los Angeles-based executive search firm, Ira W. Krinsky & Associates. He also has solicited nominations for a search committee from the Faculty Senate Executive Board, the WMU chapter of the American Association of University Professors, the Administrative Professional Association, the Western Student Association and the Graduate Student Advisory Committee.

Haenicke will chair the committee and has asked these persons to serve on it: Dennis Boyle, registrar; Nancy L. Fletcher, a graduate student; Ruth M. Heinig, communication; Dean Darrell G. Jones, Haworth College of Business; E. Thomas Lawson, chairperson of religion; Carson J. Leftwich, an undergraduate student; George S. Miller, education and professional development; Willie Mae O'Neal, University libraries; Ellen Page-Robin, community health services and sociology; and Linda L. Patterson, special assistant to the president.

The committee's first meeting is set for early August. Haenicke said he hopes to have a new provost selected by early next year.

## Tuition on agenda for Board

The Board of Trustees is expected to take action on a recommended 1990-91 tuition and required fees rate at its Friday, July 27, meeting.

The trustees will meet at 10:30 a.m. in the Board Room of the Bernhard Center. The proposed rate, which was tabled at the Board's June 29 meeting, amounts to a 6.5 percent increase over the same charges assessed last fall.
