



DAMAGE TO DALTON CENTER — This damage to the Dalton Center occurred Tuesday afternoon when an estimated 60 to 70 percent of the ceiling and duct work in the largest rehearsal room collapsed. Twenty high school students had been in the room rehearsing for Seminar '84, an annual summer music camp, but all safely left the room and escaped injury. Neither an estimate of the damage nor an explanation for the collapse was available at *Western News* press time. The \$16.2 million building opened in Sept. 1983.

New dean of education named

Arnold M. Gallegos (pronounced guy-AY-gos), 54, dean of the College of Education at Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff, has been named the new dean of the College of Education here.

His appointment as dean and professor of education and professional development with tenure, effective Aug. 1, was approved Friday, July 20, by the Board of Trustees.

"We are fortunate to have found and attracted a person of Dr. Gallegos' experience and proven abilities," said Philip Denenfeld, vice president for academic affairs. "The reaction of both faculty and staff who met him was positive and enthusiastic, with mutual respect and a shared confidence in the future of our College of Education."

"I am very pleased that Dr. Gallegos will be assuming the administrative leadership of the College, and confident that he will be a worthy successor to Dean John Sandberg."

Gallegos replaces John E. Sandberg, dean of the college since 1971, who resigned effective June 30 to serve as a tenured faculty member in the college.

Gallegos has been dean and professor of education at NAU since 1982. From 1976 to 1982, he was dean of the School of Education and professor of education at Western Washington University in Bellingham. He had been employed there since 1973, first as an associate dean for teacher education and

professor of education, then as acting dean for seven months.

He began his career in higher education at Washington State University in Pullman as an assistant professor in 1966, directing a \$120,000 grant project. He was acting associate dean and associate professor in its graduate school from 1968 to 1970, was associate director of its Social Research Center in 1970, and continued as associate professor on its graduate faculty through 1973.

Previously, Gallegos was a high school teacher of social studies and Spanish for 10 years in California. He earned a bachelor of arts degree in economics and international relations from the University of the Americas (Mexico City College), a master of arts degree in educational administration from Fresno State College and a doctor of education degree from the University of California at Los Angeles.

Gallegos has been active in many professional activities in the U.S. and abroad. In 1971, he was on leave from Washington State as an expert in programmed instruction for UNESCO in Madrid, Spain. He was a member of an international team cooperating with the Spanish Ministry of Science and Education to initiate a new educational reform.

He currently is a member of the coordinating board of the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education. Western's College of Education was awarded continuing accreditation by the council in 1982 through 1989. This past year, Gallegos was a member of the Governor's Task Force for Teacher Education in Arizona.

Gallegos is the author of many articles for scholarly journals on such topics as teacher competency testing and improving education in less developed countries.

Presidential position description OK'd

A position specification to be used in the search for a new president of Western was approved Friday, July 20, by the Board of Trustees.

The position specification is a composite of four needs assessment profiles that were developed by four different constituency groups, explained Charles H. Ludlow, the Board's vice chairman and chairman of the search committee. The composite was presented by two representatives of Korn/Ferry International, an executive search consulting firm that is assisting with the search.

Education, professional experience, and personal traits and characteristics are outlined in the position specification. They include: an earned doctorate from an accredited university; 15 years of professional experience, at least 10 of which were acquired in higher education; a demonstrated record of success in progressively more responsible posts; successful and creative experience with funding problems, alumni groups, the community at large, and local, state and federal government; and desired experience within leading public or private institutions and with an organized faculty and staff.

Intended to be used as guidelines for the search, the document includes provisions for "alternative candidates," those from outside education that need not meet the education or experience requirements listed above, "but must be an exceptional leader with a commitment to public education and a sensitivity to the goals and culture" of WMU.

The position specification also states that "the successful candidate... will need to develop a broad-based, comprehensive strategic plan" which will address such issues as academic program definition; quality of student educational and social experience; funding; affirmative action; enrollment and demographics, including the non-traditional student; constituency relationships; need for effective community, public relations and legislative programs; need to establish a unique identity among Michigan public colleges and universities; faculty age; an aging physical plant and the ever-increasing cost of supplies, facilities and maintenance; definition of the role of intercollegiate athletics; and alumni relations.

President Bernhard has announced his intentions to step down next June when he will be 65 years old and after almost serving 11 years as Western's chief executive officer.

Former department head dies

Frederick J. Rogers, 76, former head of the Department of English, died July 11 at his home in Kalamazoo.

Rogers joined Western's faculty in 1946 and served as department head from 1956 to 1966. He was president of the Faculty Senate in 1960-61, and retired with emeritus status in 1971. He was active in the Friends of the Public Library and the Chamber Music Society of Kalamazoo.

Before joining Western's faculty, Rogers taught high school English in local schools and served in the U.S. Army Air Force.

He earned a bachelor's degree from Western, a master's degree from Columbia University and a doctoral degree from the University of Michigan.

Board appoints two department chairs

The Board of Trustees Friday, July 20, approved the appointments of two academic department chairpersons.

Richard W. Phippen was named the chairperson of both the Departments of Biology and Biomedical Sciences, effective this past June 21, and Lowell E. Crow was named chairperson of the Department of Marketing, effective Aug. 13.

Phippen's appointment involves the planned merger of two academic departments, biology and biomedical sciences, in January 1985. The departments began as one unit, but were separated in 1977.

"Over the past several years, it has become clear that each department has resources that could assist the other," said A. Bruce Clarke, dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. "So because of this commonality, it has been decided to bring the

The appointment, effective this past June 4, was approved Friday, July 20, by the Board of Trustees. The office is part of the Division of Continuing Education.

"The creation of the office and the appointment of Ms. Vander Weyden represents a significant new thrust for Western," President Bernhard said. "It represents a continued, emphasized commitment to meet the educational and educational-support needs of non-traditional students.

Tuition to remain the same

Tuition rates at Western for 1984-85 will be maintained at the 1983-84 levels, it was announced at the Board of Trustees meeting Friday, July 20.

"I am delighted to report that we anticipate Governor Blanchard's signature next week on the proposed 1984-85 state appropriations bill," said President Bernhard. "It will provide \$57.6 million for WMU or an increase of 11.4 percent over the comparable figure a year ago.

"Although it actually represents a 10.7 percent increase for us, because our institutional fiscal year does not coincide with the State's fiscal year, the appropriation is a significant improvement over recent levels of state assistance."

Bernhard said the appropriation will enable Western to maintain 1984-85 tuition levels at the 1983-84 rates and also to meet Western's commitment to erase a 1983-84 budgetary deficit of more than \$1 million.

The tuition rates per credit hour are: resident undergraduate-lower division (freshman/sophomore), \$43.50; resident undergraduate-upper division (junior/senior), \$48; resident graduate, \$58.75; non-resident undergraduate-lower division (freshman/sophomore), \$109; non-resident undergraduate-upper division (junior/senior), \$119.75; and non-resident graduate, \$147.

who are older than age 25 and who represent women and minority groups. This new office reflects our awareness of that fact and our determination to be a comprehensive and responsive institution for all of the people of West Michigan."

"The Office of Evening and Weekend Programs will be the primary contact and reference point for information on programs and services available to this significant clientele," said Geoffrey A. Smith, associate dean of continuing education. "Ms. Vander Weyden will be the students' chief advocate for new programs and courses especially designed for those who find evening and weekend study most convenient."

Already more than 400 courses are offered in the late afternoon (beginning at 4 p.m. or after) and evening, Smith said, serving an estimated 7,500 students. One goal of the office will be to enable undergraduate students to complete degrees in some programs entirely through late-afternoon, evening and weekend courses. Currently only a few courses are offered on weekends.

Several graduate degrees, including some in the colleges of business and education, can be completed through courses offered primarily in the late afternoon and evening or on weekends, Smith said.

The office also will facilitate contact by students with such offices as admissions, registration, financial aid and others when those offices are not open, Smith said.

Vander Weyden, once a non-traditional student herself who completed a master's degree in communication arts and sciences at Western in 1979, has been coordinator in women's services since 1979. She earned a bachelor's degree in English at Western in 1966.
