"I encourage each member of the faculty and staff to consider making this unique contribution to our quality of life, and sometimes, to life itself," President Bernhard said last week in endorsing the drive. "It takes only about an hour to make a blood donation, and supervisors are being encouraged to facilitate participation."

Bernhard to receive honorary degree from 'K'

President Bernhard will receive an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree during commencement at Kalamazoo College at 3 p.m. Saturday.

Bernhard and two other honorary-degree recipients will participate in a colloquium titled "A Tradition of Excellence Reaffirmed," the theme of this year's commencement. The colloquium will be 11:30 a.m. that day in Dalton Theatre in the Light Fine Arts Building.

Others receiving honorary degrees are Beverly Roberts Gaventa, a Baptist scholar and educator, and Harry A. Towsley, a well known pediatrician who is now retired. The featured speaker will be Davidson Nicol, a former undersecretary-general of the United Nations.

Harkenrider receives ACT's Delphine Award

The Michigan American College Testing (ACT) Council has selected Edward W. Harkenrider, director of student financial aid and scholarships, as this year's Sister Mary Delphine Outstanding Counselor.

"The award is named in memory of Sister Mary Delphine, who served for many years as an outstanding financial aid counselor in

the state and as an adviser to the American College Testing Program (ACT) regional office," said ACT regional director James A. Eanes.

In April Harkenrider received a Distinguished Service Award from Western, recognizing his many contributions to the University and to his field. "Often called the dean of student financial aid in Michigan, Ed has tried to make the road (to college) easier, particularly for those students who--for financial reasons--believed that college was out of their grasp," Eanes said.

Harkenrider came to WMU in 1967. He has announced his retirement from WMU effective in January 1984.

Gary Fund reaches \$325,000

The 1983 goal of the Gary Athletic Fund is \$325,000 and virtually all of that figure was realized during the annual five-week campaign that ended with a victory celebration Wednesday.

Fund director Bill Doolittle reported that 1,846 contributors had pledged \$312,000 plus another \$9,000 as gifts-in-kind. Included were pledges for 177 square yards of new artificial turf in Waldo Stadium.

James Lamborn led Doolittle's 1983 volunteer organization's point standings for combined funds and membership. Edward Rossi raised contributions in excess of \$20,000 while Thomas and Barbara Tallman recruited the most members, with 93.
