



## MILLER AUDITORIUM'S FALL SERIES ANNOUNCED

Five Broadway productions, a magic show and four musical presentations make up the 1978-79 Patron's Choice Series Act I at WMU's Miller Auditorium this fall. Starting Monday, May 22, last season's patrons have a two week period to renew their ticket purchases for the coming season. Tickets go on sale to the general public on Monday, June 5.

The lineup begins Sept. 30 with the all new Doc Severinsen Show featuring a 30-piece orchestra. On Oct. 7, a panorama of Scottish entertainment, "Scotland On Parade" will offer pipers, singers, dancers and folksinging.

Homecoming weekend will feature three performances of "The Wiz," the new musical version of "The Wizard of Oz" at 8 p.m. Friday, Oct. 20, and 5 and 9 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 21. "The Peanuts Hucko Jazz Five" comes here on Oct. 25, followed by "The Blackstone Magic Show" with Harry Blackstone, Jr. on Oct. 28. The Neil Simon comedy "California Suite" will be staged Nov. 1, and Jean-Pierre Aumont comes to the campus on Nov. 3 in "The Passion of Dracula." "Diversions and Delights" with noted actor Vincent Price portraying Oscar Wilde will be seen on Nov. 7. The Four Freshmen, The Four Lads, The Four Ink Spots and The Pied Pipers make up "The Fabulous Fours" for an evening of nostalgia on Nov. 18.

The fall series ends with two performances of "The Sound of Music" on Nov. 21-22 with a star performer to be named soon.

Those who buy five or more tickets will receive a 10 percent discount on the total ticket price; WMU faculty, staff and students get a 15 percent discount. Miller Auditorium ticket office is open from 10 a.m.-6 p.m. weekdays and on evenings of performances. Phone 383-0933.

## STUDENT ART EXHIBITION BEGINS SUNDAY

A free, public exhibition of art works by Therese Dahmer, Southfield senior at WMU, will be shown from Sunday, May 21, to Sunday, May 28, in the Steers Street Gallery on campus. The presentation of recent oil paintings, mixed media, intaglio and photographs will have an opening reception at 2 p.m. May 21. The exhibition will be open throughout the week from 11 a.m.-5 p.m. daily.

Dahmer's art has been shown in the Detroit area, where she received a painting award in the 1974 Southfield Art Exhibition.

## FILM WILL SHOW DOWNTOWN ART WORKS

A 30-minute, 16mm sound/color movie of familiar and lesser known paintings, sculpture and architecture in downtown Kalamazoo is now being made by WMU's Division of Instructional Communications under grants of \$17,784 from the Kalamazoo Foundation and \$5,350 from the Michigan Council for the Arts. The content of the film is based on research WMU doctoral intern, Sesta Peekstok of Richland, who is the project director.

More than 30 works by 19 artists spanning more than 130 years of Kalamazoo history will be recorded in the motion picture. A brochure which will serve as both an instructional aid and for a walking tour guide of the downtown sector. Producer for the film is John Provancher, WMU associate professor of instructional communications.

## ALCOHOL INSTITUTE WILL MEET HERE

The 24th summer Midwest Institute of Alcohol Studies, to be held at Kalamazoo's Hilton Inn, June 11-16, will focus on developing better understanding and better resources for meeting alcohol-related human problems and problems of alcohol education. The institute will provide basic information on alcohol problems for professional people whose work brings them in contact with such problems. Admission is open to those engaged in activities in which a knowledge of alcoholism or other addiction problems would be advantageous. Among the 35 institute faculty members are: Micki East, a social worker with Kalamazoo's Big Brothers Program; Thomas Pagel, WMU associate professor of communications arts and sciences; and Sharron Surratt, assistant director of the Specialty Program in Alcohol and Drug Abuse (SPADA) at Western.

Total fee for the five-day institute is \$185. It includes attendance at all sessions, housing, parking and all meals from Sunday dinner through Friday breakfast, excluding Wednesday dinner. A \$35 non-refundable deposit must accompany registration which must be made by Friday, May 19, with the division of continuing education here. Registrar Dennis Boyle has reported the spring enrollment here is 8,305, a 2.24 percent drop from the 1977 figure. A breakdown of the current campus student population is: freshmen--311; sophomores--826; juniors--1,621; seniors--3,008; graduate students--2,361; and unclassified--178. Of the total, 4,212 are women and 4,093 are men.

## ASSERTIVENESS WORKSHOP WILL BE JUNE 3

"Assertiveness Through Body Motion," a one-day workshop sponsored by WMU's Center for Women's Services (CWS) here, will be held from 1-8:30 p.m. Saturday, June 3, in the main lounge, Wesley Foundation. Designed for non-dancers who want freedom of release from tension through movement, it will be taught by Dr. Carlene Bagnall, assistant professor of social science. She has trained in creative movement and T'ai Chi, the ancient Taoist method of moving meditation from which Kung Fu, Karate and aikido later developed.
