In groups of approximately 200, students visited campus buildings, took tests, conferred with faculty advisors, and registered for classes. Aiding them in the orientation process were 43 junior and senior students who served as student leaders.

During freshman orientation, special one-day programs are held for parents of incoming freshmen to acquaint them with the campus, services, programs, and personnel of the University. Approximately 300 parents have participated in the special program so far this summer, according to Norman Russell, assistant to the vice president for student services.

HEAVY RAINS-BIG SNOWS RELATED

The recent rainstorms and last winter's heavy snows are linked, according to Dr. Val Eichenlaub, professor of geography here. Both are affected by the jet streams, high speed winds in the upper atmosphere, and currently, the jet streams are still very far south for this time of year, he says. The air pattern is what meteorologists expect in the winter rather than for this time of year.

Eichenlaub reported that the rain gauge behind Wood Hall collected 6.2 inches of precipitation in the June 25-26 downpour. The amount establishes a record for the period, he believes.

He is the author of two books and a dozen articles, most of them dealing with the weather. Eichenlaub is a WMU graduate who earned his master's degree at the University of Michigan and his Ph.D. from Ohio State University.

CAMPUS BRIEFS

Dr. Emanuel Nodel, professor of history, took part in the recent International Baltic Conference at the University of Toronto. He presented a paper on "The Role of the Lithuanians, Latvians and Estonians in the Extermination of Baltic Jewry During World War II," and was chairman of sections on "Baltic Historiography" and "Baltic Jewry Between the Wars."

Dr. Lawrence Ziring, professor of political science, is the author of an article, "The Rann of Kutch Arbitration," a study of a territorial dispute between India and Pakistan, published in chapter form in "Pakistan in a Changing World," released by the Pakistan Institute of International Affairs.

Mary Ida Hunt, associate professor of speech pathology, described various training experiences for students in non-verbal communications recently on WKZO-TV's program "Input Three."

Dr. Marcy Murphy, associate professor of librarianship, presented a paper at the 69th annual conference of the Special Libraries Association in Kansas City, Mo. recently. It was entitled "Measuring Library Effectiveness: A Prelude to Change," and described a user survey conducted at the U.S. Air Force Academy Library to provide management with data on clientele evaluation as a basis for planning.

Dr. Helenan S. Lewis, associate professor of political science, was one of three panelists on the program "Second Look" on television station WOTV, Grand Rapids, last Sunday. She discussed California's "Proposition 13."

The first scholarly dictionary of past American library leaders has been published by Libraries Unlimited, Inc. with biographies of over 300 distinguished people. The selection of biographies was made by a special advisory board, made up of library historians and leaders of the American library profession, including Dr. Laurel Grotzinger, professor in the WMU School of Librarianship. She contributed six biographical profiles of outstanding women librarians. Regina Berneis, adjunct assistant professor of librarianship, contributed articles on two others.
