ALEX BALDASSANO is an instructor for Sponsors for Educational Opportunity, a non-profit organization dedicated to getting students from underserved high schools to and through college. Previously, they received a Ph.D. from The Graduate Center, CUNY and worked as an Adjunct Assistant Professor at CUNY Queensborough Community College, facilitating courses in composition and literature. Their research focuses on the intersections of transgender studies and medieval literature and aims to contribute to contemporary social justice work, especially in the trans community.

LUCY BARNHOUSE is a Visiting Assistant Professor of History at Wartburg College. Her research focuses on the intersections between legal, religious, and medical history in late medieval Germany. Her forthcoming monograph, *Houses of God, Places for the Sick*, examines the place of hospitals in the religious and social networks of late medieval cities. Her research focuses on past and present intersections of performance and political agency. Her current project examines the Weimar Republic's agitprop theatre movement and how its amateur performers used the stage to forge a distinct political practice.

DR. JAN SHAW teaches Middle English Literature in the Department of English at the University of Sydney. She has published on women in medieval romance and on the transmission of medieval themes in modern and contemporary literature by women. Jan also works on narrative and gender in leadership studies, making connections between recent leadership theory and the humanities. She is the coeditor of *Storytelling: Critical and Creative Approaches* (2013) and sole author of *Space, Gender and Memory in Middle English Romance* (2016), a monograph which considers the interweaving of space, time and memory in the scripting of feminine life stories. Jan's current work explores how the use of gendered identities in fifteenth-century romance opens up conversations about models of leadership and female agency.

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
