



MAGAZINE NOTES COURSES' POPULARITY

Enrollment in agriculture courses here at the University is booming, according to an article in the May issue of "Michigan Farmer" magazine.

Written by Dick Lehnert, editor of the Lansing-based publication which has a circulation of more than 82,000, the article points out that the number of WMU students taking agriculture courses is increasing at the rate of 50 percent a year. It quotes Dr. Max Benne, associate professor of agriculture, as saying, "We're pleased with our popularity even though we're bursting at the seams."

The magazine describes the teacher-student relationship as "personalized" because of the limited size of the WMU agriculture department--two full-time and two part-time faculty, and a student enrollment of approximately 150. Dr. Lee Baker, head of the department since 1954, and Benne, are the full-time faculty members, while John Ball and Larry Harris teach on a part-time basis.

HIGH SCHOOL PAPER SEMINARS TO START

Up to 60 select high school students will make paper, visit Michigan paper-making mills and conduct pilot plant experiments during the fifth annual program in chemistry and engineering in two one-week summer seminars here at the University.

Entitled "Forest Resources, Pulp and Paper, and the Environment," the separate sessions, June 19-24 and June 26-July 1, will each have a limit of 30 students. The seminars are designed for students with interest and ability in science and mathematics, and who are challenged by an intensive learning experience. They will explore the interrelationships of science and engineering in the pulp and paper and forest products industries and how these relate to national environmental problems.

While here, the students also will receive orientation into college life by staying in campus residence halls and taking part in social activities during evening hours. Exposure to career opportunities in chemistry, engineering and computer science is a prime purpose of the seminars.

The University Student Center and all WMU libraries will be closed July 2-4 for the Independence Day holiday. They will open for regular summer hours on Tuesday, July 5.

FACULTY MEMBER WINS YALE FELLOWSHIP

Dr. Michael S. Pritchard, associate professor and chairperson of the department of philosophy, has been selected as a Fellow in the Teachers in Residence Program of the National Endowment for Humanities (NEH) at Yale University.

He will be granted special leave from September, 1977 to May, 1978 to accept the prestigious \$15,000 award. The program for which Pritchard has been selected is a seminar entitled "Human Flourishing and Human Destructiveness: Issues on the Boundaries of Religion, Ethics and Psychology."

The award is the fourth in the field of philosophy received by a WMU faculty member within the past two months. The other recipients are Dr. Arthur Falk, professor of philosophy; Dr. Joseph Elin, associate professor of philosophy; and Dr. E. Thomas Lawson, chairperson of the department of religion.

NEW "READING HORIZONS" PUBLISHED

Nine feature articles, ranging from "Media Techniques for the Reading Teacher" to "An Assessment of Phonics Knowledge in Special Education Teachers," are in the spring issue of "Reading Horizons," a quarterly publication of WMU's Reading Center and Clinic, and the Homer L. J. Carter Reading Council, Kalamazoo.

Included in the 53-page booklet is an editorial comment entitled "Getting It Together," by Reading Horizons editor, Kenneth VanderMeulen, assistant professor of teacher education.
