

**TRUSTEE CAINE ON VICE PRESIDENTIAL SEARCH COMMITTEE**

University Trustee Robert D. Caine of Kalamazoo has replaced Trustee Maury E. Parfet of Hickory Corners on the advisory committee to assist WMU President John T. Bernhard in the selection of a new vice president for academic affairs.

Dr. Fred V. Hartenstein, professor and chairman, department of management, and Dr. Charles T. Brown, professor of communication arts and sciences, have been elected chairman and associate chairman, respectively, of the committee.

**PRES. BERNHARD TO ADDRESS NATIONAL CONFERENCE**

University President John T. Bernhard will make a presentation to the education committee of the National Conference of State Legislatures on behalf of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities Thursday, Aug. 4, at Detroit's new Renaissance Center. His seminar topic, "Higher Education: Cost Containment and Accountability," will explore how higher education can provide continued access for citizens in a manner which is cost efficient, well organized and accountable to state legislatures and the general public.

**BEGIN SEARCH FOR "OUTSTANDING WMU ALUMNI"**

For Western's Diamond Jubilee Year celebration beginning this fall, outstanding graduates will be invited to make presentations related to their achievements since leaving the University, and meet with faculty and students.

In a recent letter to all the departments at the University, Dr. Samuel I. Clark, director of Honors College and chairman of the year-long celebration, asked for names of outstanding alumni--scientists, writers, doctors, artists, lawyers, professors, businessmen, politicians, engineers, teachers, poets and others. He noted that the program has three purposes: to honor accomplished alumni, to point out the achievements of former students to today's students, and "...to reaffirm the achievements of faculty at WMU as evidenced by their former students." He indicated that gifts from the D. C. Shilling Fund and other sources at the University will provide for travel, room and board for the selected alumni.

**PAPER TECH WILL HOST SEMINAR**

Thirty-nine speaker sessions will highlight the 7th annual "Specialty Coatings and Laminations Seminar" here Monday through Friday, Aug. 15-19, sponsored by the University's paper science and engineering department and Division of Continuing Education. The speakers represent the converting industry, machinery manufacturers, suppliers, users of converted products, and academic/research institutions who will discuss developments, trends and problem areas.

Sessions, which begin daily at 8:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m., will be held the first three days in the WMU Paper Science and Engineering Auditorium, McCracken Hall, and the final two days at Kalamazoo's Hilton Inn. A dinner at 6 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 18, in the Kalamazoo Hilton Inn will feature H. O. Ranger, president, Consulting Associates, Milwaukee, Wis., speaking on "The Role of Consultants in Converting."

**GRANT AIDS RECYCLING UNIT UNDER CONSTRUCTION**

A \$15,000 grant to the University's Paper Technology Foundation, Inc. to help complete a paper fiber recycling unit here has been made by the Frank E. Gannett Newspaper Foundation, Inc., Rochester, N.Y.

The gift represents nearly 10 percent of the \$160,000 needed to complete the \$700,000 recycling pilot plant in Western's Louis Calder Paper Research and Development Center, the only one of its type in the nation and possibly the world. It will be completed in time for a Sept. 22 dedication.

The recycling unit here is being constructed without the use of state or University funds. The facility will be used to produce graduates with the training to analyze, develop, control and administer programs related to energy, resource recovery and environmental matters.

**SCHOOL OF LIBRARIANSHIP TRANSFERRED**

An administrative reorganization involving the transfer of the School of Librarianship from the Graduate College as an autonomous unit reporting directly to the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs has been announced by University President John T. Bernhard, effective July 1.

The change also includes the appointment of the director of the School of Librarianship, Dr. Jean E. Lowrie, to membership on the University's Administrative Council and, for personnel purposes under the WMU/AAUP collective bargaining agreement, the faculty of the School shall continue to be associated with the Unaffiliated Units under Section 9, Article XVI (1976-77).

Bernhard noted that all of the changes were recommended by Dr. Stephen R. Mitchell, WMU vice president for academic affairs, because of the School of Librarianship's outstanding reputation and continued growth.

**SEPTEMBER EXHIBIT WILL FEATURE UNIVERSITY ART WORKS**

Samplings from various Western Michigan University art collections will be exhibited during Sept. 7-28 in the College of General Studies' Space Gallery, 2700 Knauss Hall. Included in the free, public display will be pieces from the Albert M. Todd family bequest and several art objects purchased by Harry S. Hefner and Lydia Siedschlag, emeritus professors of art, for use in residence halls, according to Marie Combs, director of the gallery.

She has asked University faculty and staff members who have borrowed pieces from Western's permanent art collection to contact her at 349-8166 so that those works also can be considered for inclusion in the September exhibition.

**"PROFESSIONAL ETHICS" WILL BE WORKSHOP TOPIC**

The definition of "professional ethics" is one of a number of topics to be discussed during the Friday and Saturday, Aug. 5-6 and Aug. 12-13 workshops presented by WMU's Center for Public Administration Programs (CPAP) from 9 a.m.-4 p.m. daily in the Davis Room, Walwood Union.

The Aug. 12-13 repeat sessions were added because of the press for admittance by public officials in urban, township and county governments and by public administration students. The two sessions already are filled and no openings remain. Dr. Ralph Chandler, WMU associate professor of political science and CPAP field service coordinator, will teach the two workshops.

**K-COLLEGE WRITERS WILL GIVE POETRY/PROSE READING**

Patricia Goedicke and Leonard Robinson, writers-in-residence this summer at Kalamazoo College, will read selections from their works at a free, public "brown bag" reading Thursday, Aug. 11 at noon in the English Center, 3324 Brown Hall. Goedicke is the author of three books of poetry. Robinson, formerly on the editorial staffs of Esquire and The New Yorker magazines, has had six of his books published, including two novels. The reading is presented by the WMU English department under the auspices of the Michigan Council for the Arts.

**FRENCH PLAY WILL BE GIVEN AUG. 6**

Eugene Ionesco's one act play, "La Lecon" will be presented in French in a free, public performance by the University's department of modern and classical languages at 8:30 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 6, in 1114 Brown Hall. Directed by Helene Kudzia, a graduate student from Kalamazoo, the cast consists of Dr. Joseph Reish, assistant professor of French; Tamarah Ashton, a senior at Kalamazoo Loy Norrix High School; and Nelly Kurzmann, a Kalamazoo resident. Janet Rolando, a WMU graduate student from Owosso, is assistant director.

#### CRIME PREVENTION PROCEDURES BEING REVIEWED

C. Keith Sheeler, director of the University's Department of Public Safety, in a letter to all deans, chairpersons, directors, managers and department heads, has said that his department is currently reviewing crime prevention procedures on campus. The purpose is to develop a campus-wide policy which will establish standardized procedures and directives involving the security of persons, facilities and equipment on campus. The theft of University property accounted for over 46 per cent of all losses which occurred during the 1976-77 fiscal year, he noted. "In many cases, these thefts were preventable had common sense precautions been followed," Sheeler stated.

He has asked the assistance of the campus community for recommendations and suggestions for inclusion in the new policy. Specifically, Sheeler requested "...any information concerning security problems you have experienced and how you feel they could be solved." General topics in the policy would include: (1) Responsibilities of the University, (2) Responsibilities of employees, (3) Restricted hours of building usage, (4) Key control and (5) Security of University property. Replies should be sent to Officer Brian A. Hoppe, Crime Prevention Bureau, WMU.

#### FRESHMEN FINISH ORIENTATION PROCESS

Summer orientation has been completed by approximately 2,400 students who will be freshmen at the University this fall. In groups of 125 to 150, they visited here for three day periods to meet faculty advisors, register for classes, take a battery of tests and tour campus buildings. Forty specially-trained student leaders aided in the "get-acquainted" process, directed by Norman K. Russell, orientation director and assistant to the vice president for student services.

#### ZIRING EDITS BOOK ON PAKISTAN

A new book termed "the most comprehensive treatment to date on Pakistan's history, politics, economy, social forces and foreign policy" was released four days before the surprise July 5 military overthrow of that country's government, according to Dr. Lawrence Ziring, WMU political science professor and the book's senior editor.

"Pakistan: The Long View," has 16 chapters by different authors. Ziring, who wrote the preface, noted that the book grew out of papers presented at a Duke University symposium on Pakistan which he organized several years ago.
