Gifts and grants of \$1,447,924 were received by the University in May, Robert B. Wetnight, Vice President for Finance, reported to the Board of Trustees at their June 18 meeting here. Of the total, \$248,684 was for instruction, \$52,910 for research, \$10,868 for public service, \$1,080,006 for student financial aid, and \$55,465 in other gifts.

#### ANNOUNCE SAFETY CONTEST WINNERS

Robert S. Wirbel, the University's Safety Coordinator, has announced the winners for the second period of the WMU safety contest. The libraries won the award in the General Services Division for the second time. They went 10 months without a recordable accident. Printing Services won second place because of less exposure hours, although they had no accidents during the period.

Goldsworth Valley #1 Food Service was the winner in the Food Service Division. Burnham Hall Food Service was second.

In Auxiliary Enterprises--Custodial Division, Donald Farrow's group won with over 13,000 exposure hours without an accident. Units under James Amos and Bill Meulman tied for second place. In the State Building--Custodial Division, Leonard Srackangast's group won over those of John Bennett and Donna Griffith because of more exposure hours.

#### CAMPUS BRIEFS

Kenneth VanderMeulen, assistant professor of teacher education and editor of "Reading Horizons," the quarterly professional journal published here, is the author of "Reading in the Secondary School: Studying Spelling Successfully" which appears in the current issue of the publication.

The co-editor of "Party Politics and Elections in Korea" published by the Research Institute on Korean Affairs is Dr. C. I. Eugene Kim, professor of political science. He is the author of five papers written for the book.

Dr. Edward L. Galligan and Dr. Clare R. Goldfarb, professor and associate professor of English, respectively, have both written articles which appear in the summer issue of the "South Atlantic Quarterly." Galligan's is "The Usefulness of Arthur Koestler's Theory of Jokes," while Goldfarb's is "Solzhenitsyn's Literary Experiment."

Dr. Vijay K. Arora, assistant professor of physics, and graduate students Carlos Munera of Colombia and Mahmoud Jaafarian of Iran, are co-authors of a paper which will be published in the International Journal of Physics and Chemistry of Solids. Their research was partially supported by the Faculty Research and Fellowship Fund of WMU. The paper is entitled "High Field Magnetoresistance and Magnetothermal emf in Many-Valley Semiconductors with Ellipsoidal Energy Surface."

Trent Kynaston, assistant professor of music, has received a \$3,500 Jazz/Folk/Ethnic Composition Fellowship Grant from the National Endowment for the Arts to write a work for saxophone and orchestra by Sept. 1. It will have its premiere when it is played by the University Symphony Orchestra on Oct. 3. On July 29, Kynaston will present a lecture-recital at the 5th World Saxophone Congress in London, England.

Dr. C. J. Gianakaris, professor of English, has written a book review of "Shakespeare's Heroical Histories: 'Henry VI' and Its Literary Tradition" by David Riggs. It appears in the annual Shakespeare Studies published by Harvard University Press.
