



LIBRARIES GIVEN KELLOGG FOUNDATION GRANT

A \$7,700 grant for the next two years to buy terminal equipment to connect the University's libraries with the Ohio College Library Center at Columbus, has been awarded WMU by the W. K. Kellogg Foundation of Battle Creek.

The funds will also pay for training the University's library personnel in the use of the equipment. According to Carl H. Sachtleben, director of university libraries here, the computerized arrangement will make over 2-million bibliographic entries available to the University libraries.

ANNOUNCE FOUR-YEAR PROJECT

A new four year nationwide project to develop guidelines and standards for educational evaluation is based at the Evaluation Center in the University's College of Education. Dr. Daniel L. Stufflebeam, professor of educational leadership, has been named director of the project and chairman of a national Joint Committee on Guidelines and Standards for Educational Evaluation. The committee was recently awarded a \$90,690 first-year, two-part grant by Lilly Endowment, Inc., a private national foundation.

Under a subcontract made with the committee through the American Educational Research Association (AERA), the Evaluation Center will administer the project and work toward two major end products: (1) a companion volume to the "Standards for Educational and Psychological Tests" by the AERA, American Psychological Association (APA), and National Council on Measurement in Education (NCME); (2) a plan for periodic review and revision of the evaluation standards.

PAPER COURSE IS HERE NEXT MONTH

The 22nd annual course in "Coated Paper Manufacture--Principles and Practices," will be held from Sunday, Aug. 1 to Friday, Aug. 13 in the University's paper science and engineering department. The coating course consists of lectures and laboratory work and is designed for paper industry personnel new to paper coating who want both a broad and detailed instruction in the entire coating industry. It will include basic principles, theory, modern commercial practices, equipment, materials and laboratory techniques.

ANOTHER "FIRST" FOR WMU

The first doctor of education degree in special education ever presented by WMU will go to Florence M. Taber of Stevensville.

Although her degree requirements were finished at the end of the spring session, she will not receive her diploma until the summer commencement, Aug. 20. She has already accepted a position to teach learning disabilities at Nazareth College in Kalamazoo.

WMU/K-COLLEGE SHARE GRANT

The fund will support a conference entitled "Philosophy, Law and Medicine" which will be held on both campuses on Oct. 15-17. It will be made up of nine symposia and will be coordinated by WMU's Dr. Michael Pritchard, associate professor of philosophy, and Dr. Wade Robison, associate professor of philosophy at K-College. Topics scheduled for discussion include genetic screening, human experimentation, euthanasia and transplant procedures for scarce resources.

BRONCO BASEBALL TEAM WINS VARSITY LETTERS

Nineteen members of the University's 1976 baseball team have been presented varsity letter awards. The team finished the season with a 25-22 record.
