Remind Faculty of Student Rights

Among those formal "Student Academic Rights" (Undergraduate Catalog, Pp. 53-54) endorsed as University policy, two in particular frequently are not observed by faculty, with resultant misunderstandings, problems, and even the filing of student grievances, according to Dr. Philip Denenfeld, associate vice president for academic affairs.

The two "Rights" are reprinted below as a reminder to faculty:

1. "Students should be fully informed by the faculty about course requirements, evaluating procedures and academic criteria to be used in each class. This information should be provided at the beginning of the semester or sufficiently in advance of actual evaluation."

2. "Students have the right to have all their examinations and other (written) graded material made available to them with an explanation of the grading criteria."

Faculty should retain all such material not returned to the student for at least one full semester after the course was given.* Faculty are not required to return such material to the student but must provide reasonable access to it."

*Material from a winter semester course should be retained until the completion of the following fall semester.

Change Financial Aid Procedures

Western has inaugurated a new procedure to simplify the process of awarding financial help to full-time on-campus students.

The program, which was introduced by the Office of Student Financial Aid and Scholarships, will allow students to complete financial aid requirements by mail. In addition to saving time for the applicant, it will speed up notification of the awards.

Details of the five steps required of WMU students to apply for financial aid for the coming spring and/or summer sessions are now available in the Office of Financial Aid and Scholarships, 3306 Student Services Building.

Set Collective Bargaining Vote For Feb. 26-27

WMU teaching faculty will vote Feb. 26-27 to decide whether they want a collective bargaining unit on campus.

The election will be held from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. in Sangren Hall. Further details will be announced later.

Last week, the Michigan Employment Relations Commission (MERC), who will conduct the campus election, issued an order excluding 49 academic department heads and chairmen, plus the University ombudsman, from the prospective WMU teaching faculty bargaining unit. The MERC ruling was in favor of the University administration; Western's chapter of the American Association of University Professors had petitioned to have those 50 persons included in the proposed bargaining unit.

Earlier this week, Dr. Stephen R. Mitchell, WMU vice president for academic affairs, sent to all Western faculty "the first in a series of papers dealing with collective bargaining and its impact on the University." In it, he concluded, "The administration of Western Michigan University opposes collective bargaining for the faculty. We believe that it is incompatible with the concept of shared governance, that it would substantially reduce the role of the faculty in critical decision-making, and that it would seriously and grievously erode the professionalism of which this faculty has been justifiably proud. We urge you to consider these matters when you cast your ballot."

Mitchell indicated that 848 faculty members will be eligible to vote, according to the MERC order describing the proposed unit. That order is as follows: "All regular full-time and part-time teaching faculty of Western Michigan University, including rank faculty in the library, the Division of Instructional Communications, Educational Resources Center and Counseling Center; but excluding all temporary full-time and temporary part-time teaching faculty, department heads and chairpeople, including the directors of social work, librarianship, Counseling Center and Educational Resources Center, and the directors of schools, ombudsman, deans, associate deans, and assistant deans, United States Department of Defense personnel teaching in the department of military science, persons on adjunct and visiting appointments, and persons with faculty rank in administrative positions."

Blood Drive Is Still On

Contrary to an earlier report, the WMU winter semester blood drive will be held as originally scheduled from Feb. 3-6 in the University Health Center. Sponsored by Alpha Phi Omega, a national service fraternity, the drive will be held from noon to 5:45 p.m. each day. The goal is 1,200 pints.

Plan Series of Individualizing Instruction Workshops Feb. 3-10

Five nationally-known educational specialists will conduct a series of workshops on "Individualizing Instruction" for interested WMU faculty here Feb. 3-10.

Arranged by the University's office of instructional development, the workshops will serve as a free resource to the various departments to assist in the in-service training of teaching staffs. Department chairmen have been invited to schedule a program on days when the specialists are available.

On Feb. 3, Dr. Jack Michael, professor of psychology, and Dr. Robert Travers, distinguished university professor, both of WMU, will offer their services to University departments. Michael is a nationally-recognized authority on the Keller Method of individualized instruction. It assumes that students learn at different times and at different rates, and that every normal college student is capable of 90 to 100 per cent mastery of undergraduate course material.

Travers, author of the "Second Handbook of Research on Teaching," is internationally known for his educational research.

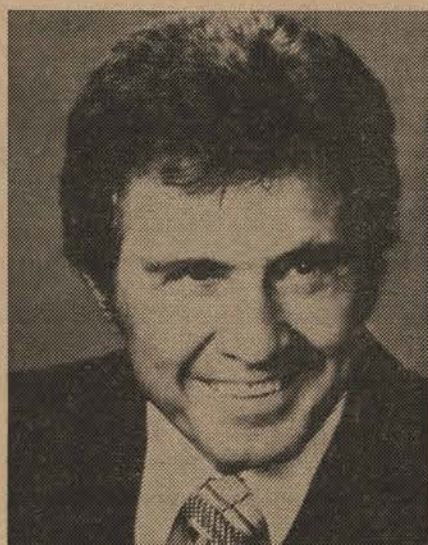
On Feb. 5 and 6, Dr. John Feldhusen, professor of educational psychology and assistant dean for instructional development at Purdue University, will visit Kalamazoo and WMU. He is currently the editor of a series of books on instructional development and a noted educational psychologist.

Dr. Samuel Postlethwaite, professor of botany at Purdue, will serve as a resource person for workshops

on Feb. 7. He is known for his audio-tutorial forms of individualized instruction. Recently, the National Science Foundation sponsored his effort in the development of an individualized undergraduate curriculum in biological sciences.

Another WMU faculty member, Dr. Richard Malott, professor of psychology, is also an authority on the Keller Method and is considered a very successful "individualizer" of instruction by his colleagues. He will present his personal experiences with the course he has developed in the psychology department.

Dr. Howard Poole, associate professor in the division of instructional communications, is in charge of arrangements for the workshops.

The programs were produced in Kalamazoo by WMU's Audio Services. Research, interviews and scripts were prepared by two WMU communications graduates, Sharon Wolbers and Ruth Hamilton. Music is played and sung by Gloria Larrieu.

The series will be heard Monday evenings at 8:30 with repeat broadcasts Saturday mornings at 11:30. WMUK's 50,000 watt signal covers a 160-mile listening circle around Kalamazoo.

Named to State Humanities Council

Howard Dooley, WMU assistant professor of humanities, has been elected to membership on the Michigan Council for the Humanities as one of only two members from Southwestern Michigan.

The Council will administer the state-based humanities program supported by a \$200,000 grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities. After a number of meetings, the Council chose as its statewide theme: "The Michigan Economy: A Humanistic Understanding of Production, Consumption, and Leisure."

Solo Percussion Recital Sat.

Percussionist Don Baker will present a solo recital at 8 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 1, in Oakland Recital Hall. His program will include performances on all types of percussion instruments.

Baker conducts the University Percussion Ensemble and is assistant director of the University Marching Band.

Mary Jane Rupert and Charles Osborne will assist on the program. Miss Rupert will do the harp accompaniment to Ibert's "Entr'acte" and the piano part on "Concert Asiatique" by Tomasi. Dr. Osborne, on flute, will do the first of the Teleman "Six Canonic Sonatas for Two Flutes" with Baker on marimba, and the "Variations for Multiple Percussion and Flute" by George Frock.

Faculty String Quartet To Perform

The WMU Faculty String Quartet will present a free public concert at 8 p.m. Friday, Jan. 31, in Oakland Recital Hall.

Bassist Marshall Hutchinson will be making his debut with the ensemble, which includes Gerald Fischbach and Olive Parkes, violins; Joseph Work, viola; and Herbert Butler, cello.

Hutchinson is an instructor of music theory and double bass for the department of music. He joined the faculty in the fall of 1974 after having completed his master's degree "with highest distinction" from Indiana University. He will be joining the Faculty String Quartet in the performance of Dvorak's "Quintet, Opus 77."

Also on the program will be the Beethoven "Quartet in C minor," Opus 18, Number 4 and Shostakovich's "Quartet Number 11," Opus 122. The Shostakovich had its American premiere by Western's Faculty String Quartet in November of 1967, and has not been performed at WMU since then. It is a seven movement work, played without pause.

Cite Grad Students

Grants of \$200 each have been awarded to two Kalamazoo graduate students by the WMU Graduate College student research fund. They are John A. Roberts and Saul Stahl.

The grants will cover travel expenses to an upcoming meeting of the American Mathematical Society in Washington, D.C., where the two doctoral students in mathematics will present research findings. Funds for the grants were provided by Western's Annual Fund.

An additional \$3,000 in grants will be awarded Feb. 1 from the graduate student research fund. Applications may be obtained from Dr. Sid Dykstra, associate dean of the Graduate College, 2324 Administration Building.

Elected to New Vic Board

Frank R. Jamison, WMU manager of television services and associate professor of instructional communications, has been elected to the board of directors of New Vic Theatricals, Inc. of Kalamazoo.

The 11 directors serve as the governing board for the New Vic Theatre which is now in its eighth season. Originally a coffee house, it developed into a full-fledged drama and musical theatre at 134 E. Vine Street.

Zambian Educator To Discuss Africa

Dr. Fola Soremekun of the University of Zambia, Lusaka, Zambia, Africa, will discuss "Recent Political Developments in Portuguese Africa" at an 11:30 a.m. luncheon Wednesday, Feb. 5, here in 159 University Student Center.

Sponsored by the Institute of International and Area Studies, the informal lecture and discussion is open to all interested students, faculty and staff.

An Institute spokesman describes Dr. Soremekun as a close confidante of the nationalist leaders of Angola and Mozambique. He recently returned from a fact-finding study tour of those countries. One of his publications, "Religion and Politics in Angola 1880-1950," is being published in Portuguese, and he was recently appointed to the Institute for African Studies, University of Ife, Ile-Ife, Nigeria.

Debaters Return From Illinois Trip

Western's debate team posted a 2-6 record at the annual Illinois State University debate tournament held this past weekend at Normal, Ill.

Team members Charles Fisher, a Lansing freshman, and Kim Hunter, a sophomore from Detroit, debated the topic "Resolved: that the power of the presidency should be significantly curtailed."

The WMU debate team is supervised by Dr. Chester Hunt, professor of sociology, and coached by James Markan, graduate assistant in general studies.

Participates in Program

Dr. Stephanie Demetrakopoulos, assistant professor of English, recently was one of three participants in a panel discussion "Creation and Destruction: The Poet as Suicide—Sylvia Plath," at Kalamazoo College. Also, she recently spoke on "The Older Woman In English and American Literature" at the Modern Language Association meeting in New York.

Demetrakopoulos is the author of "Angel Iconography and Milton's Raphael," which was published in an issue of The Explicator. The article creates the sensual aspects of Milton's Raphael, an angel sent to warn Adam and Eve against the effects of too much passion.

University Theatre To Stage 'The Tempest'

Shakespeare's "majestic and beautiful visioned people with villains and demons, spirits and clowns"—The Tempest—will be presented by the University Theatre at 8 p.m. Feb. 13-15 in the Laura V. Shaw Theatre.

Probably the last play wholly written by Shakespeare, it is regarded by many as a culmination of the playwright's wisdom and technique. The play is set on an island somewhere in the Mediterranean, but director William Livingston of the University Theatre staff believes that "Prospero's island is a place in the imagination, outside time, where the passions and ambitions of human beings are worked out."

Cast as Prospero, the right Duke of Milan, is Randace L. Rollison, a WMU sophomore from Drayton Plains. In the role of Prospero's daughter Miranda is Anne Terease Fox, a junior.

Kalamazoo freshman John Hardy Garner has been cast as Ferdinand, son to the King of Naples. The "airy sprite" Ariel will be portrayed by Allen Park senior Sheila Dunleavy. Performing the role of Caliban, a savage and deformed slave, is sophomore Don VandenHuevel of Zeeland. Sebastian, brother to the King of Naples, and Antonio, brother to Prospero and the usurping Duke of Milan, will be portrayed by graduate student Marte Cole and senior Ed Trainor, respectively.

East Lansing freshman Mary Ann Abood will appear as the jester Trinculo, and Bronson sophomore Dennis J. Sielken as the drunken butler Stephano. Sophomore Paul D. Kelly of Jackson is cast as Gonzalo, an honest old counselor; and junior Lance Tucker of Tecumseh is Alonso, the King of Naples. Spirits Iris, Ceres, and Juno will be portrayed, respectively, by Alpena freshman Jo VanSchoick, Catherine Wagner, and Cynthia Kania. Beverly Knickerbocker, a sophomore from Adrian, and Jim Frey, a Detroit junior, will portray lords Adrian and Francisco, respectively.

In other roles are Muskegon junior James A. Kroll; Detroit sophomore David Breault; and Worcester, Massachusetts freshman Richard Arnold. Also appearing are Mark L. Peters of Herongate, Essex, England and Grosse Pointe Park; junior Laura L. Marsden of Howell; freshman Linda Rose VanTiffin of Rochester; and freshman Karen Ann Haller of Livonia.

Director Livingston has designed the stage setting for this intriguing play with UT staff member Jill K. Peterson designing the costumes and student technical assistant Martin Peck designing the lighting. Original music for this production has been composed by David Fish with choreography by Frank Folino and makeup and mask designs by Barbara Thompson. Karen Ann Haller is assisting the director, and Jim Frey is technical director.
