DR. WAYNE WONDERLEY'S DEATH REPORTED

Word has been received here of the death of Dr. Wayne Wonderley, 61, at his home in Lexington, Ky. on July 26. The former head of Western Michigan University's language department had suffered a stroke three weeks earlier. At the time of his death, Wonderley was head of the department of Germanic languages at the University of Kentucky, a position he held since leaving here in 1966. Before he joined the WMU faculty, he taught at Ohio State University and Hiram College in Ohio. Wonderley is survived by his wife, Gladys, and four children.

FORMER FACULTY MEMBER DIES

Catherine Wilkerson, who served as a Latin and English critic teacher from 1929 to 1945 at what was then called the Portage Consolidated Training School, died on Aug. 2 at Kearney, Mo. She was 80 and had been ill for a long time. After leaving WMU in 1945, she accepted a position at Northern Michigan University where she continued until her retirement.

PROGRAM FUNDED BY HEW GRANT

A \$62,189 grant from the Social and Rehabilitation Service of the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare will finance a one year program at the University directed at child neglect and child abuse. Under the direction of Robert H. Barstow, School of Social Work, the program provides special training for graduate students in social work and in-service staff members of social service agencies. He said, "We are looking for new and innovative ways of training people to handle a terribly serious problem in our society." The program continues through June 30, 1976.

PROGRAM FOR OVERWEIGHT PEOPLE WILL START

The University's Counseling Center will offer a program for people who are overweight and want to do something about it beginning next month. Conducted by Dr. Milton R. Cudney, professor of counseling, the program requires that all participants be: (1) 30 pounds of more overweight, (2) want to do something about reducing, (3) be a WMU student, staff or faculty member, and (4) agree to a pre-program interview, pre- and post-testing, take part in an Elimination of Self-Defeating Behaviors Workshop, have up to 10 hours of one-to-one in-depth counseling, keep a diary of activities and apply the program to everyday activities. It will run for the one semester, and, according to Cudney, will be demanding in time and energy. All interested persons should apply at the Counseling Center, Student Services Building, or call 383-1850. There is no charge for the program.
