Board of Trustees Allocates Search Committee Membership

Report of the Committee on Procedure for the naming of the Search Committee for a successor to President Miller which was adopted by the Western Michigan University Board of Trustees February 16, 1973, reads as follows:

The Board is mindful of its Constitutional responsibility to elect a president of the University to succeed President Miller when his retirement becomes effective. The Board also recognizes the vital importance of contribution to the selection process by the various recognized constituents of the University. For this purpose the Board will establish a Search Committee to help identify, seek out and appraise qualified candidates for the position of president of the University. The Procedure Committee has two goals: to establish the size and composition of the Search Committee and to formulate the Board's charge to that committee.

Therefore, the Procedure Committee recommends:

First, that the Search Committee have 13 members: four faculty, three students, two administrative and professional personnel, one alumnus and three Trustees. The Board will appoint the members of the Search Committee after considering lists submitted by the various constituent groups. The Board will consult as soon as feasible with these groups as to the number of names to be submitted. The Board of Trustees will appoint the Chairman of the Search Committee. The Search Committee will have an Executive Secretary (very likely a full-time job), appointed by its chairman with the approval of the Board. Clerical assistance, and private independent facilities on campus will be made available to the Search Committee and its executive secretary.

Second, various individuals and constituent groups have been and will be solicited for opinions and suggested language for the charge that the Board will make to the Search Committee. Trustee Dykema added that the Procedure Committee recommends that the Board proceed to organize and charge the Search Committee as rapidly as practicable, consistent with thorough and thoughtful consultation with others in the University community.

A moratorium on physical modifications in University facilities has been in effect since June 1972. Only those changes which have been deemed absolutely essential have been approved by the University's Physical Facilities Committee. The Committee has recently approved a partial lifting of the moratorium effective March 1, 1973. Requests for changes in space may be sent to Dr. Myron L. Coulter, Chairman, Physical Facilities Committee under the following conditions:

1. Requests for alterations up to \$2,000 must be approved by the department head and the appropriate dean or supervisor.
2. Any requests over \$2,000 must be accompanied by written approval of the appropriate dean and the appropriate vice president.
3. Requests for alterations of space should be accompanied by a sketch of the proposed changes and an estimate of costs which can be obtained from the Physical Plant Department.
4. These conditions include all proposed projects regardless of the source of funding. The only exception are those requests which are considered as routine maintenance. These items will be processed through the Physical Plant Department in the usual manner.

The submission of a request does not guarantee that the request will be approved by the Physical Facilities Committee.

- c. If independent audits are conducted and submitted to the Student Budget Review and Allocation Board.
2. Funds so assessed and collected will be accounted for in the University Agency Fund and be the property of the student organizations.
3. Specific assessments currently proposed subject to No. 1 above are \$1.50 per semester; 75 cents per session.

All monies collected will be distributed by the Student Budget Allocation and Review Board to all student organizations including the Associated Student Government as well as student organizations seeking student assessments in the future.
5. The Western Herald, WIDR and Threshold will be funded directly from the General Fund until such time as independent incorporated status is arranged for these activities. Monies currently being allotted to student organizations will be returned to the General Fund.
6. Student organizations will be funded for programs contributing to the cultural, educational, recreational or physical well being of the college community. No funds may be expended for personal benefit of individuals or private corporations; to finance political candidates and campaigns and religious purposes or for any activity contrary to the laws of the State of Michigan and the Federal Government. Specific criteria and uses of student funds will be established by the Student Budget Allocation and Review Board in cooperation with the Office of Vice President for Student Services. With the exception of these limitations and annual audits, student organizations otherwise will have complete autonomy in the spending of monies allotted to them.
7. This student assessment shall be subject to approval by referendum vote of the students every two years.

10. **Small Claims Court**

This court handles civil cases involving claims under \$300.00. No lawyer is required to present the case. Both parties involved must agree to settle the matter in this court. Either party may remove the case to the regular docket of the District Court, in which case the rules of evidence apply and there is a right of appeal. The judge makes the decision. To file a claim, go to one of the Clerk's Offices listed below. The charge for filing a claim is \$5.00; plus a service fee of \$2.00 for certified mail, or a fee of \$5.00 plus 10 cents a mile travel for a process server.

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- governing other personal leaves of absence.
2. A leave of absence for personal reasons (other than sick leave) of not to exceed one (1) year may be granted without pay and without loss of seniority to a regular employee who has completed two (2) years of continuous service with the University.
 3. Employees on a personal leave of absence are not specifically guaranteed a position upon return, unless arrangements have been made in writing prior to the leave, that their department can and will guarantee them their return to their position they held prior to the leave. In other cases persons returning from a personal leave should report to the University Personnel Department two (2) weeks prior to the expiration of the leave to report their availability for work. Every effort will be made by the Personnel Department to place returning employees in a position comparable to the position held prior to the leave. If the returning employees cannot be placed within 90 days after reporting to the University Personnel Department, they may continue to seek a University position, but as the status of new applicants.
 4. During an approved leave of absence, the employees may continue their membership in group insurances by paying the full cost of their premiums.
 5. Seniority credits, longevity service credit and all continuous service benefits will be credited to employees upon their return from an approved personal leave of absence.
