Statement by

President James W. Miller

The energy crisis presents a challenge which taxes the ingenuity of everyone. How this challenge is met is important to our present and, more importantly, to our future. The University community should accept the responsibility of doing its share to alleviate to the extent possible any ill effects caused by a shortage of fuel and power.

Action was taken immediately following President Nixon's energy address when Vice President Robert B. Wetnight ordered all thermostats lowered to 68 degrees; ordered the elimination of all decorative lighting; and issued notices that University cars, trucks and buses are not to be driven in excess of 50 miles per hour.

These steps are most helpful, of course, but they are restrictive in nature. It would be of great value if we were to take some positive steps. A committee with representatives of the faculty, of students and staff has been named by Mr. Wetnight and from this group and its sub-committees will come, I am sure, some affirmative recommendations. In the meantime, I ask that serious considerations be given by every person of this University community to ways in which energy can be conserved. I would like to suggest that starting now department heads carefully check transportation requests and wherever possible develop car pools. I would ask also that the same consideration be given to the use of buses—that they be used for more than one group at a time, if possible. I request that students, faculty and staff check for unnecessary lighting and convey suggestions to Vice President Wetnight. It is important to recognize that a way to avoid rigid controls and restrictions is to develop programs of energy conservation and observe recommendations on a voluntary basis.

Robert H. Williams, director of Physical Plant, is chairman of the Energy Conservation Committee. He is assisted by faculty, students and staff on a main and three sub-committees.

Members of the main committee on energy conservation are: Mr. Kenneth Hunter, student; Miss Wendy Gates, student; Mr. Dale Williams, President Local 1668 AFSCME; Dr. George Bradley, faculty, Department of Physics; Dr. Jack Wood, faculty, Department of Biology; and Mr. Duncan Clarkson, professional staff, Admissions Office.

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Pedestrian Mall a Reality—Closing of Michigan Ave. Set for Friday

Western Michigan University will have its long-planned pedestrian campus when classes resume November 26 following the Thanksgiving recess. With the opening of Howard Street, between Michigan Avenue and Kendall Road today, it will be possible to close that portion of Michigan Avenue from West Hays Road to Marion Avenue later this week.

With the closing of a portion of Michigan Avenue, the academic core of the West campus no longer will be bisected by a heavily traveled city street. This development, which routes through traffic around campus, gives to our faculty, students and staff a measure of safety which could not be achieved while a heavily used vehicular artery was a part of the campus.

In addition to the important factor of pedestrian safety, the closing of Michigan Avenue will allow the development of a pedestrian mall on what has been a city street. This will be an ecological and esthetic improvement. The Board of Trustees has requested a hearing on a petition to vacate Gilkison Avenue, between Michigan Avenue and Wilbur Street. That stretch, with a portion of Vande Giessen Road, will be landscaped along with the vacated portion of Michigan Avenue.

The reality of a pedestrian West campus has been brought about by the continuing efforts and good offices of city and state officials, legislators and those members of the Western Michigan University community who have devoted long hours to the planning and promotion of this concept.

To minimize confusion when classes resume Monday, the following suggestions, together with the map on page 3, are offered to acquaint all concerned with the most easily accessible and quickest route to parking areas.

- West bound traffic on West Michigan, oriented to facilities located in the northeast quadrant (Zone V), should follow North Dormitory Road north to the Sangren Hall lots or other facilities.
- West bound traffic on West Michigan, oriented to facilities located in the southeast quadrant (Zone II), should follow Stadium Drive to Oliver Street, turn right

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REFUND DUE

Inadvertently the 75 cents charged to all dormitory residents for the support of WIDR radio station was collected with the Fall Semester room and board payments. Under a plan approved during the 1973 Winter Semester whereby all University students pay an assessment to support student organizations, these fees were not to have been collected.
