Introduction

Western Michigan University is a national research university with a warm and welcoming feel that provides the top-notch programs, faculty, facilities, and hands-on learning opportunities students need to excel in graduate school, the workplace, and life. A public institution founded in 1903, it offers a learner centered, discovery driven, and globally engaged environment where its nearly 24,000 students from across the United States and some 100 other countries can flourish.

- The Carnegie Foundation classifies WMU as a higher-research doctoral university.
- Phi Beta Kappa, the nation's most prestigious honor society, has chosen to grant chapters to WMU and just 102 other public institutions.
- *U.S. News & World Report* has designated WMU one of America's best national universities for 25 consecutive years, placing it in the top-tier since 2011.
- *Washington Monthly* categorizes WMU as both a top-100 national university and a Best Bang for the Buck school.
- *INSIGHT Into Diversity* presented awards to WMU in 2013, 2014 and 2015 in recognition of its "outstanding commitment to diversity and inclusion."
- *Military Times EDGE* magazine ranks WMU among the best U.S. institutions for military veterans, and WMU is the only Michigan school to appear on all six years of its annual Best for Vets list.
- The Sustainable Endowments Institute named WMU one of the country's six winners of 2015 Best of GRITS—Green Revolving Investment Tracking System—awards, honoring the University as the large institution with the most carbon emissions saved to date.

WMU offers 254 degree programs through seven degree-granting colleges: Arts and Sciences, Aviation, Education and Human Development, Engineering and Applied Sciences, Fine Arts, Haworth College of Business, and Health and Human Services. Students may choose from 148 bachelor's programs, the second most undergraduate programs of any public school in the state; 74 master's programs; and 31 doctoral programs. Many of these offerings have earned a national or international reputation, and several are provided online or close to home through regional sites in the Michigan cities of Battle Creek, Benton Harbor, Grand Rapids, Lansing, Royal Oak, Muskegon, and Traverse City. In addition, WMU is formally affiliated with two private, nonprofit schools that bear its name: the WMU Homer Stryker M.D. School of Medicine, located in Kalamazoo, and WMU Thomas M. Cooley Law School, with three campuses in Michigan and one in Florida.

Faculty members have been trained at the world's leading universities and bring a global perspective to their classrooms. In addition to being passionate about teaching, these scholars conduct \$20-\$30 million in externally funded research each year. They regularly involve undergraduate as well as graduate students in their work, and routinely share their cutting-edge discoveries in class. This dynamic academic environment is bolstered by some of the finest instructional facilities and research institutes in the Midwest, as well as a rich array of study-abroad programs, internship opportunities, and public/private-sector collaborations. Despite its size, complexity and status, however, WMU remains one of the most affordable and accessible schools in Michigan. The University ranked 10th in tuition and fees among the state's 15 public universities in 2015-16, while continuing to provide a friendly and supportive climate. At WMU, students expect and receive one-on-one attention even from senior-level faculty members, and experienced mentors, tutors, advisors and career specialists are always within easy reach.

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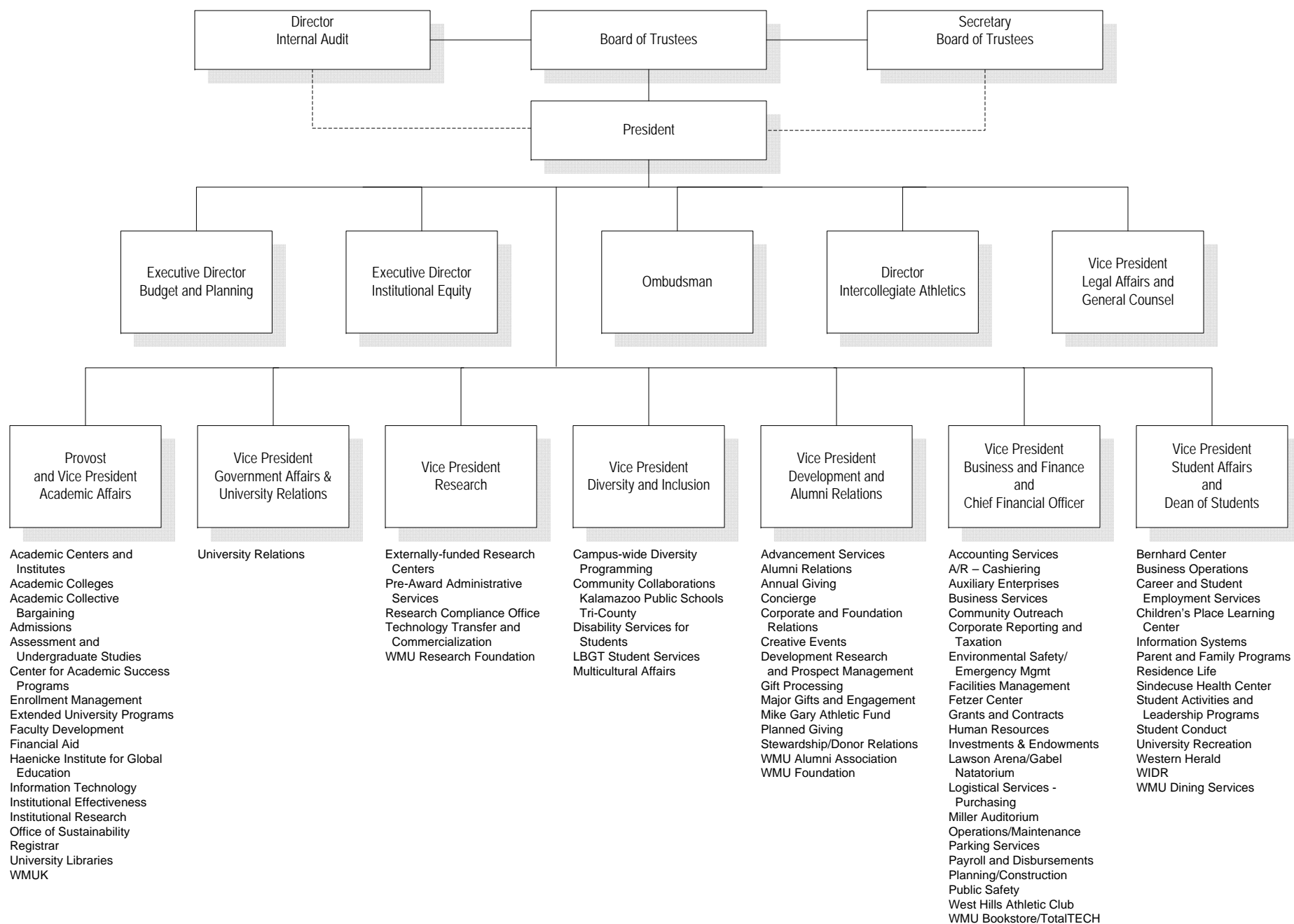

WESTERN MICHIGAN UNIVERSITY LIBRARIES

University Libraries provides facilities and technology for groups and individuals to engage with extensive online and print collections. The **Dwight B. Waldo Library** (Main) built in 1958, expanded in 1967 and renovated and expanded in 1991, is named after the University's first president. Waldo Library houses materials that support learning in the humanities, social sciences, sciences, technology and business. Notable circulating collections include the Ann Kercher Memorial Collection of materials on Africa south of the Sahara; the Randall Frazier Memorial Collection of the history and culture of Black America; materials on the history, religion, philosophy, and culture of the Medieval period; the Leslie H. Wood Memorial Collection of materials in geography and geology; an extensive collection of maps and atlases; and U.S. and Michigan government documents. The Department of Special Collections, located on the third floor of Waldo Library, houses 67 medieval manuscripts and over 40,000 books, including medieval manuscript facsimiles, children's literature and American women's poetry.

The **Gary and Rita Swain Education Library**, was opened in August 2012 in the new Sangren Hall. It has five reservable group study rooms equipped with large screens and whiteboards, and a designated quiet study room. The **Harper C. Maybee Music and Dance Library**, located in the Dalton Center, houses over 50,000 books, periodicals and music scores. Its collection of more than 17,000 sound and video recordings includes concerts from the WMU School of Music. Listening and viewing facilities are available. The **Archives and Regional History Collections**, located the Charles C and Lynn L. Zhang Legacy Collections Center, houses unique materials on southwest Michigan, including manuscripts of its early residents. This library also serves as the Regional Depository of the State Archives for public records and collects, preserves, and makes accessible University records.

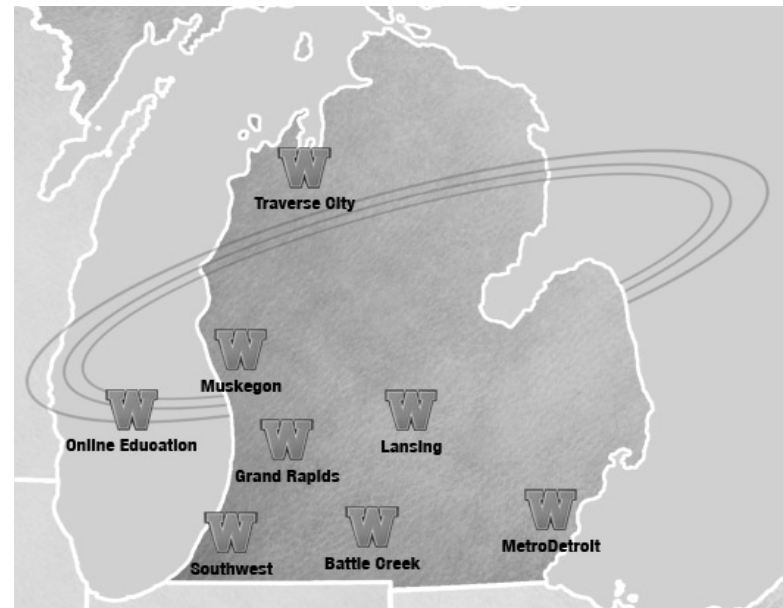

The mission of the Carl and Winifred Lee Honors College is to provide an exceptional undergraduate experience for high achieving students, to inspire in our graduates a thirst for the lifelong pursuit of creative inquiry and discovery, to provide our students with the skill and passion to address critical challenges, and to foster personal responsibility informed by a global perspective. The Lee Honors College was founded in 1962 and has a current enrollment of more than 1,700 undergraduate students. Our diverse students, representing all seven of WMU's academic colleges, are pursuing over 150 different majors and programs of study. In addition to honors courses, we also offer substantial co-curricular activities and other unique opportunities designed to enhance the college experience for our students.

The Lee Honors College offers WMU undergraduate students the ambience and benefits of a small private college combined with the resources and diverse programmatic offerings of a major research institution. Each fall and spring more than 40 honors courses, with enrollments typically capped at 20 students, are offered. These courses are open only to current honors students. The honors college also offers unique educational experiences, such as the Study in the States program. Costs for travel associated with Study in the States courses are entirely paid by the honors college, with honors students only responsible for paying tuition.

The Lee Honors College is housed in a beautiful, modern, LEED Silver Certified facility which offers honors students a large lounge, kitchen, classroom and conference facilities. Our Peer Student Success Team (PSST) mentors are paired with freshmen to help foster a successful transition to WMU. The PSST group also facilitates a number of volunteer opportunities, encouraging honors students to get involved in our local community. The Lee Honors College hosts a weekly Lyceum Lecture series featuring lectures from faculty and community experts. Recent series topics have included Race Matters, Living With Uncertainty, Global Citizenship and Sustainable Energy Future. A weekly evening series in the college, Mix It Up, offers a combination of professional development workshops and opportunities for students to relax and socialize.

Honors students are required to complete a minimum of 18 honors credits and three credits of honors thesis. Honors credits may be earned for honors courses, as well as through the study of foreign languages, independent study, study abroad, field experiences and internships. All students are required to complete 20 hours of community service each year. Honors students are also required to complete an honors thesis, which is an original work of scholarship or creative activity, reflecting the academic standards of the student's chosen program of study. The thesis work is completed in close consultation with a WMU faculty expert and at least one additional committee member with significant expertise in the area chosen for study. The honors thesis is intended to allow students to apply the knowledge and skills they have gained from their studies at WMU to create an authentic work of scholarship. Examples of honors theses include senior engineering design projects, creative works of fiction, original documentaries, educational curricula, original performances or works of art and many other types of research projects or papers.

The Lee Honors College also offers several competitive scholarships, available only to current honors students. These include scholarships to support study abroad, thesis research and presentation of scholarly works at regional, national and international conferences. On behalf of the University, the Lee Honors College recruits and helps qualified applicants to prepare for prestigious scholarships including the Rhodes, Gates Cambridge, British Marshall, Goldwater, Truman, Fulbright, Mellon Fellowship and Morris K. Udall Scholarships. Upon completion of the honors program requirements, students graduate from the Lee Honors College with recognition in the WMU commencement program, on the diploma and with special notation on the academic transcript.

Fall 2015

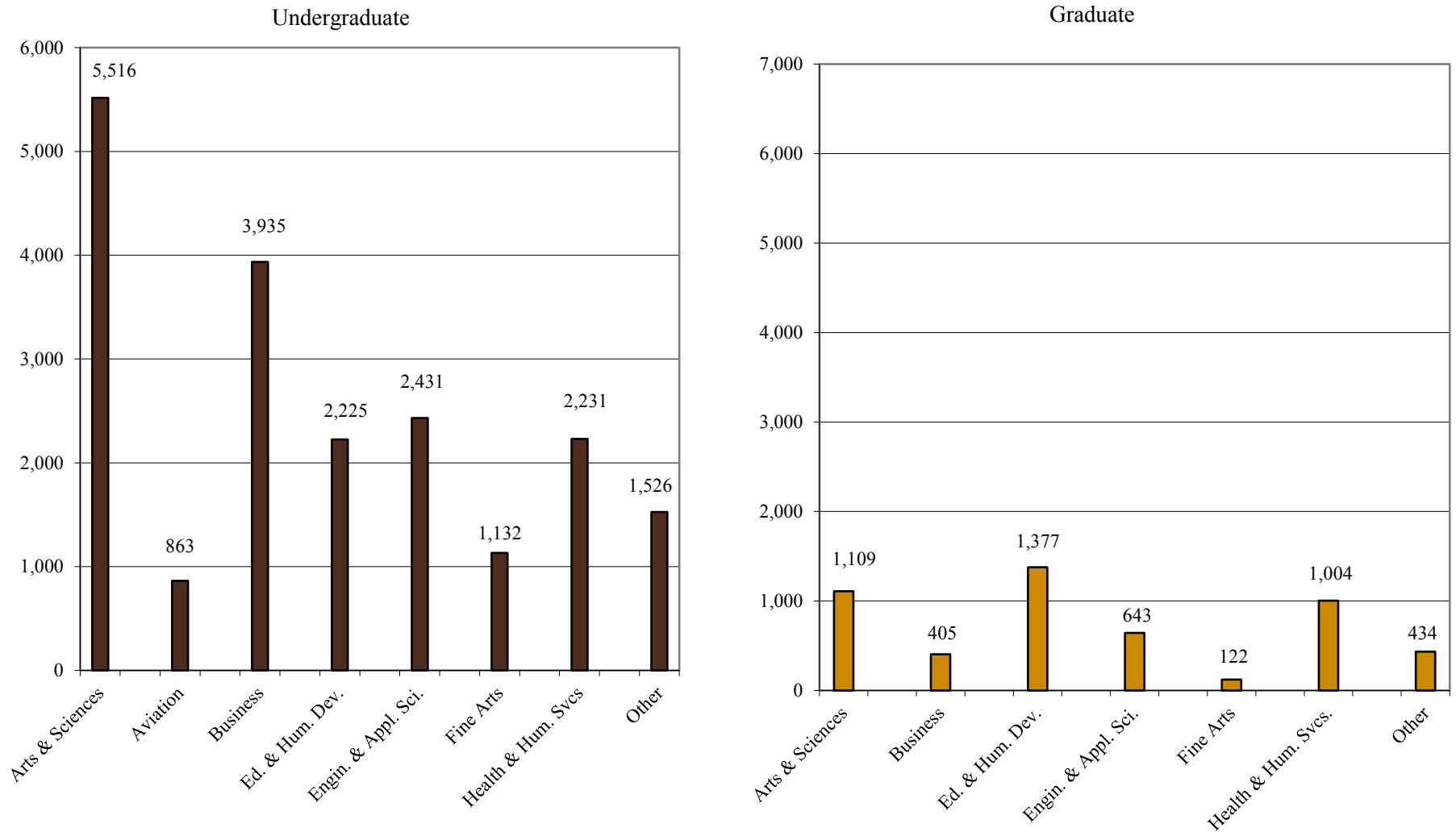

 Undergraduate and Graduate, Fall 2015

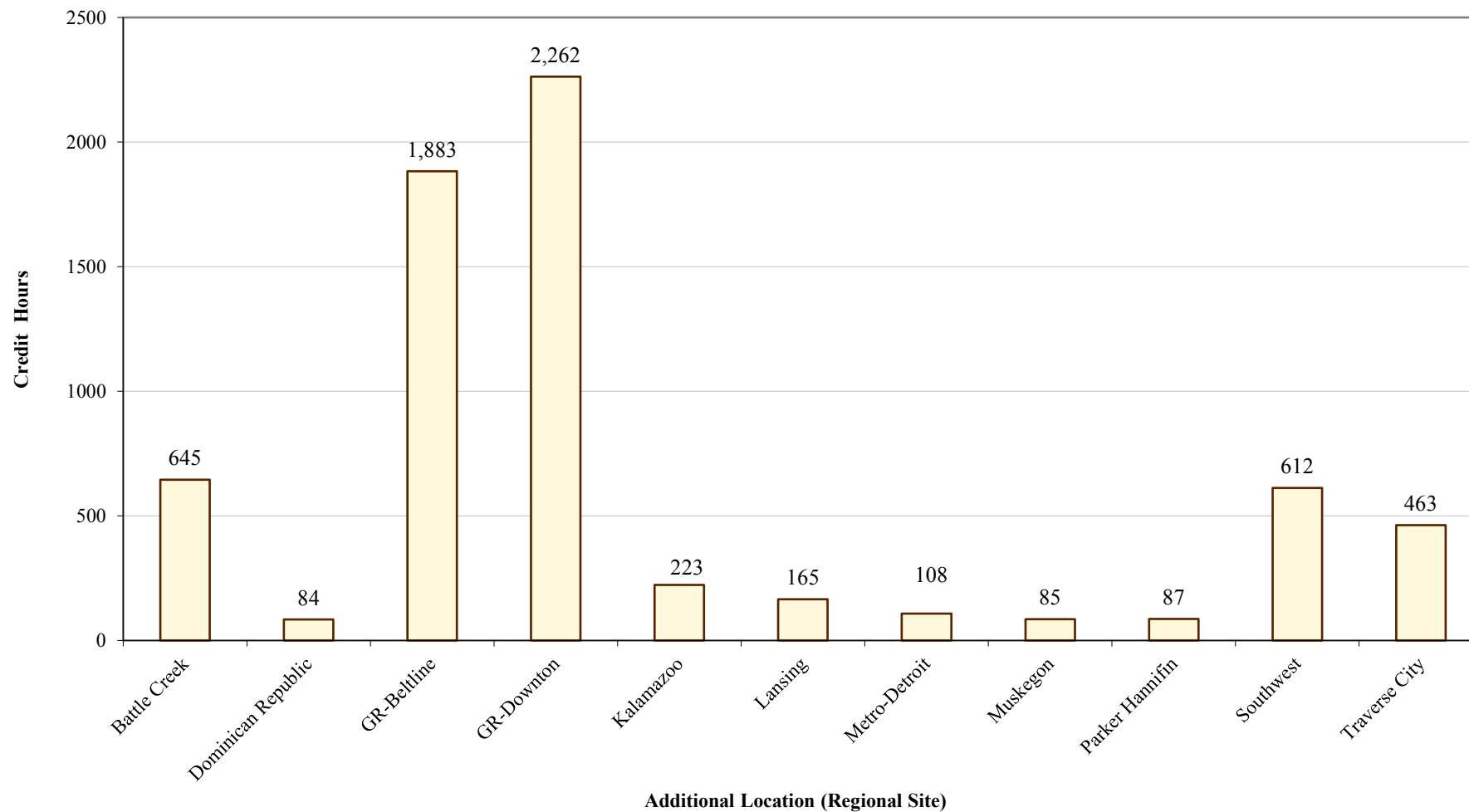

2010-11 through 2014-15

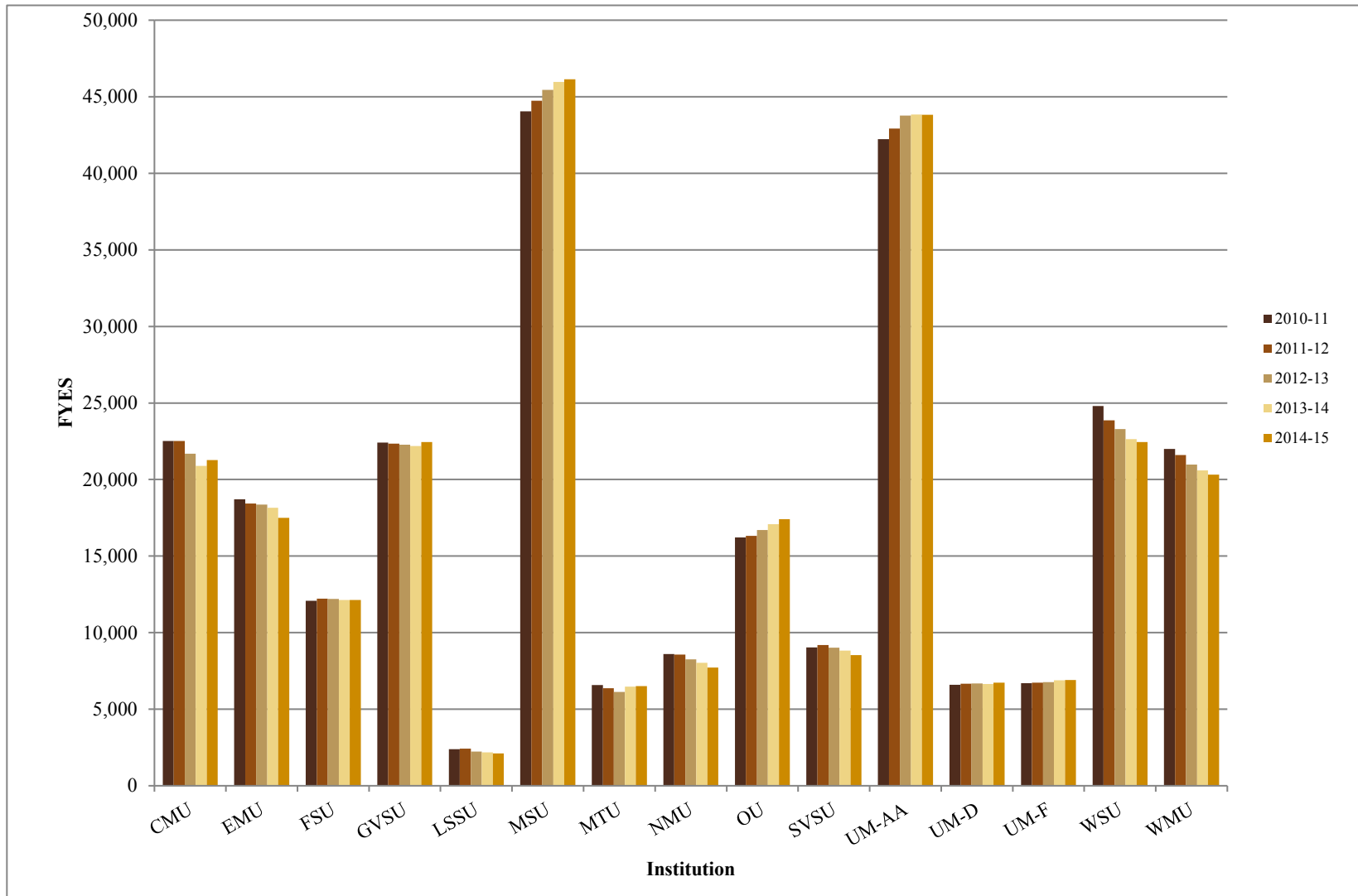

Fall 2011 through Fall 2015

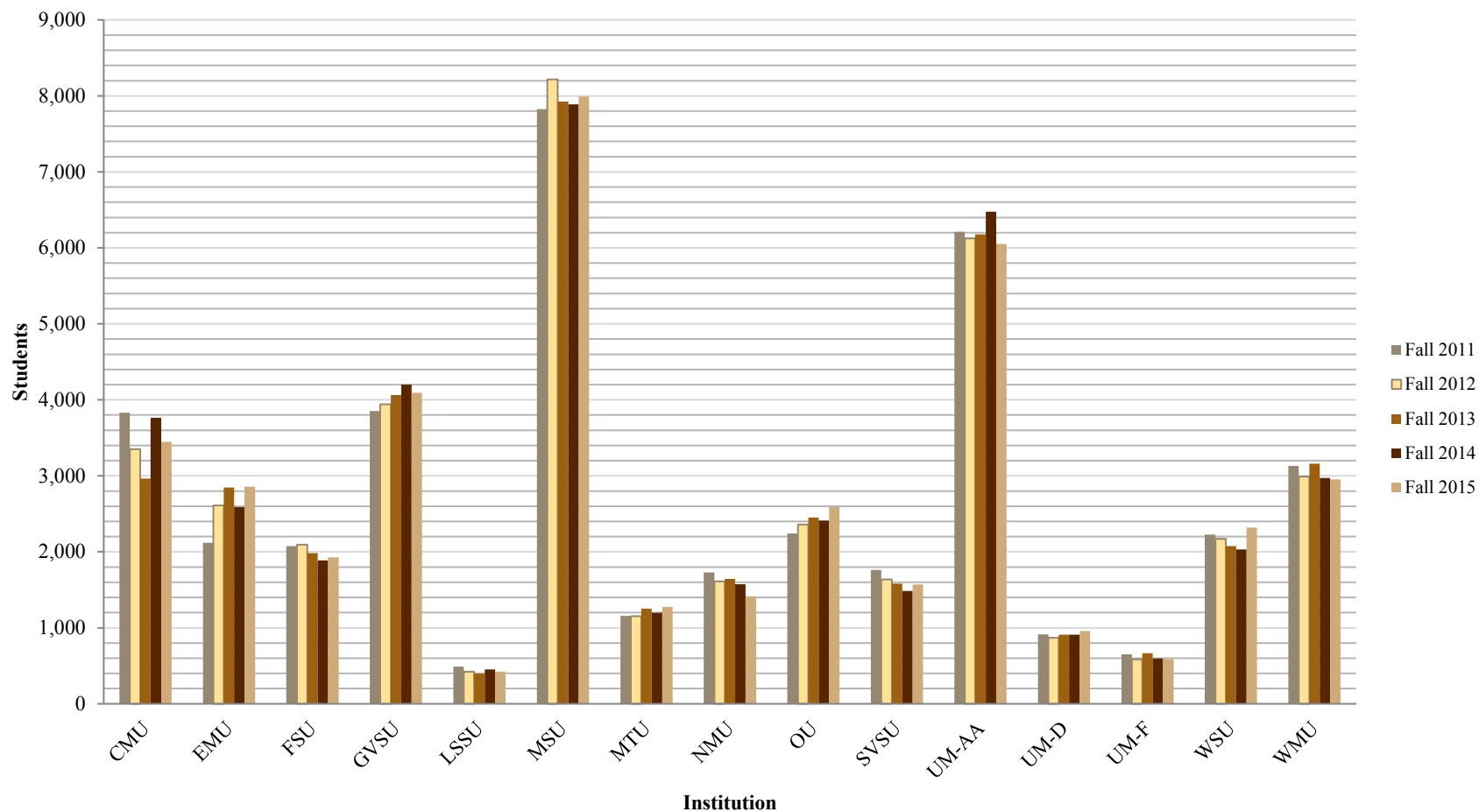

Fall 2015

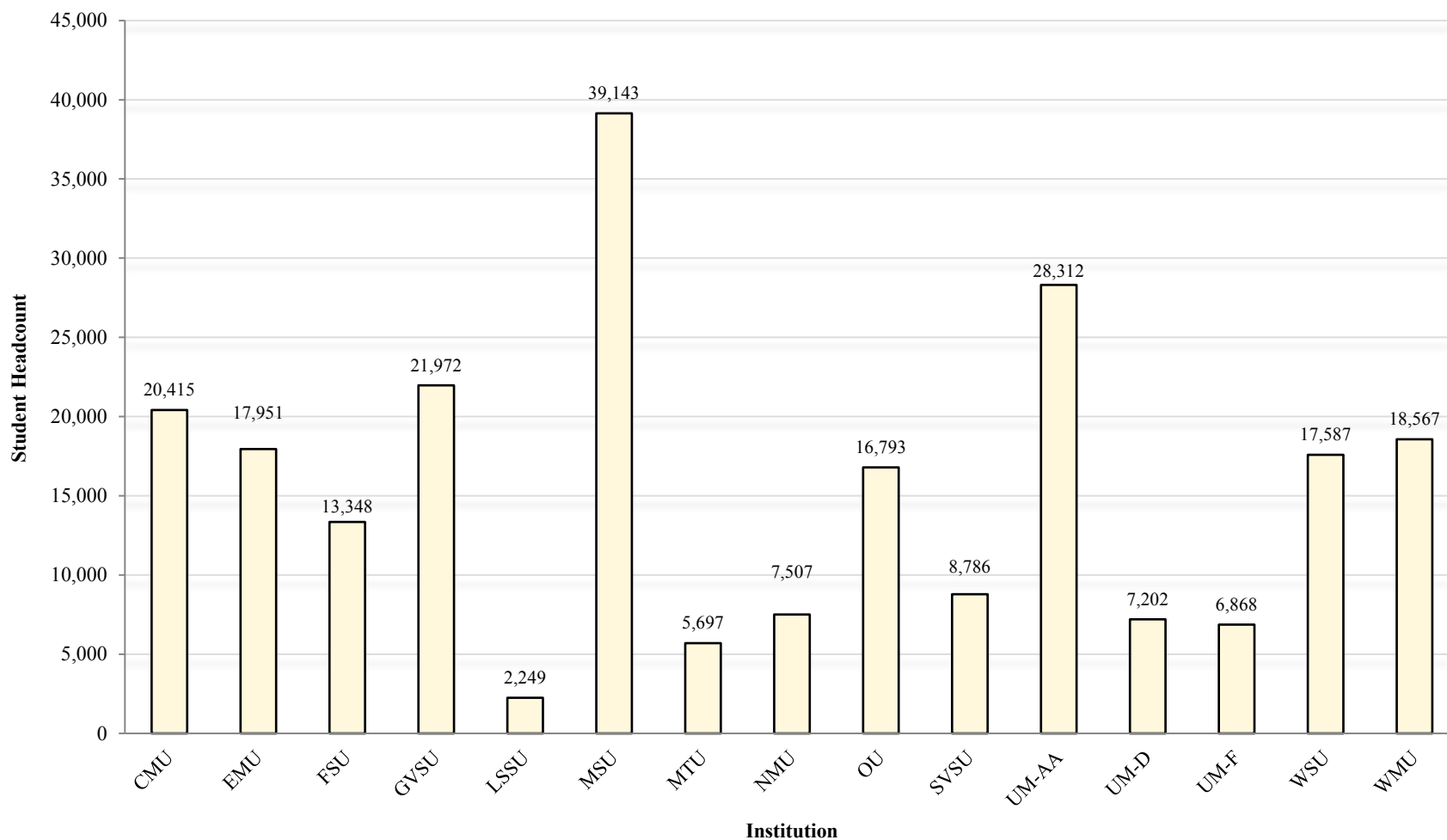

Fall 2015

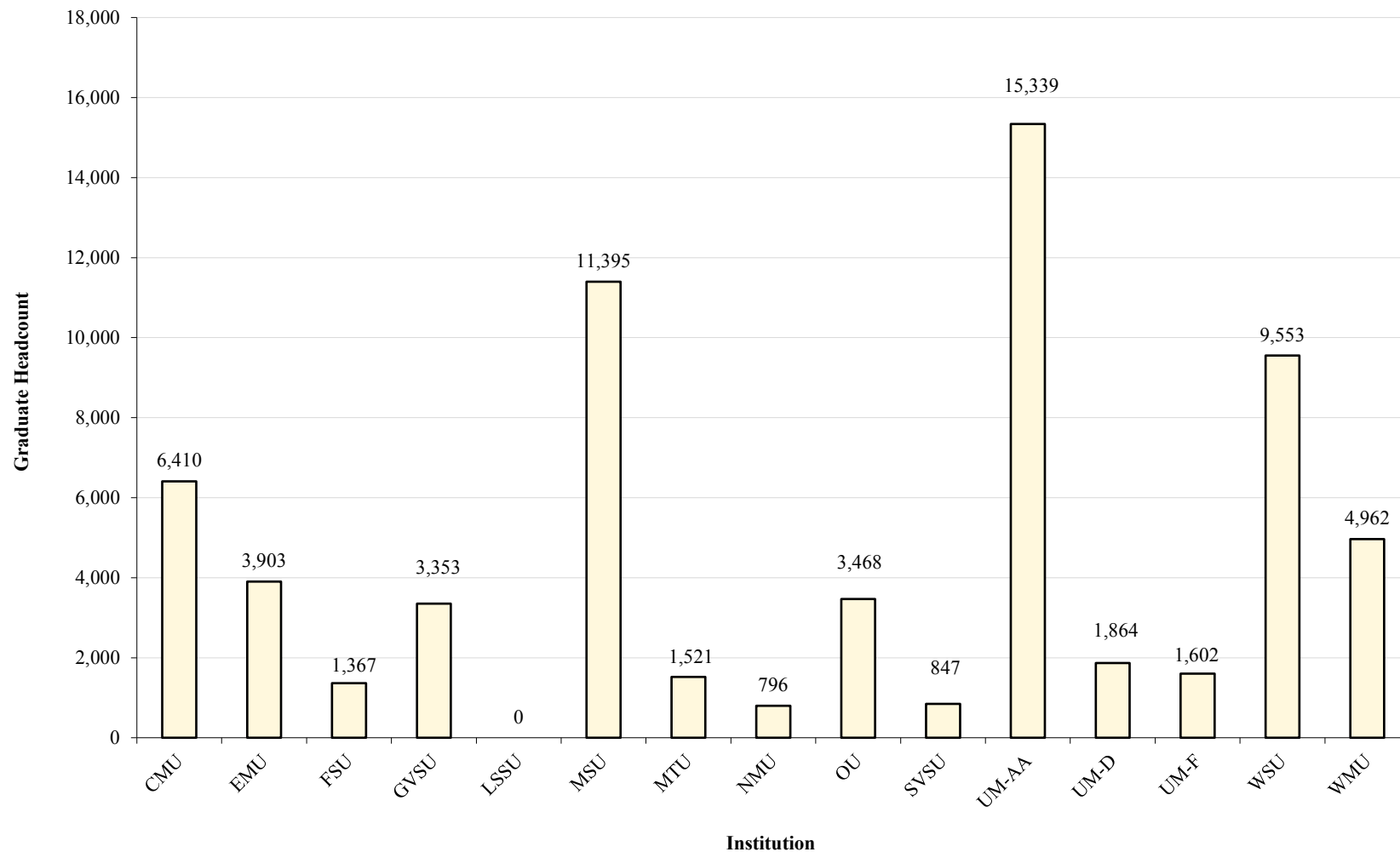

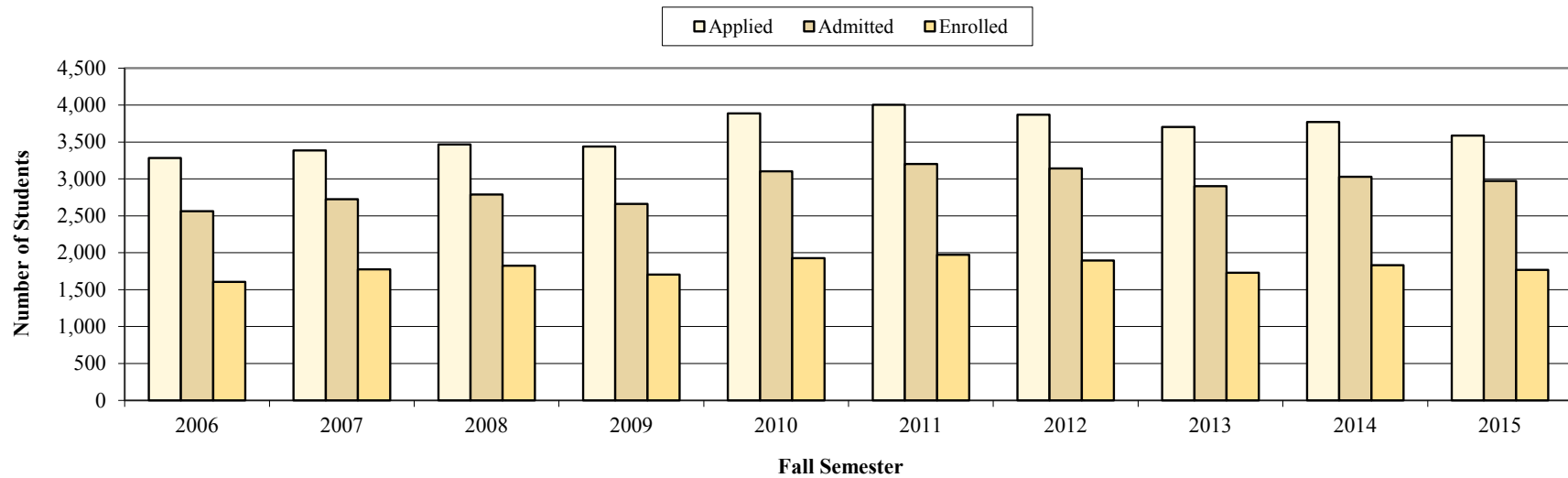

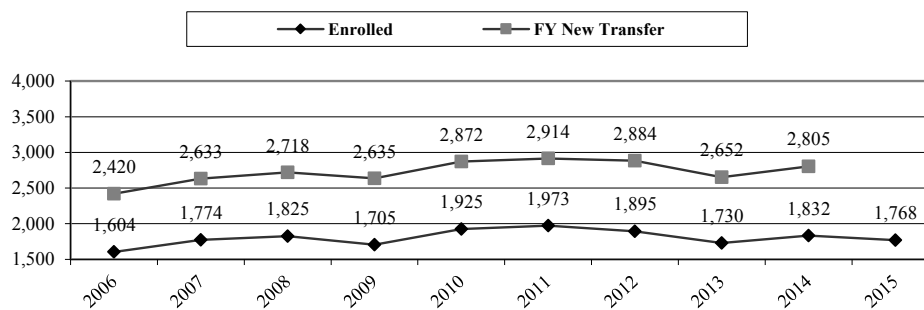

Fiscal Years 2008-09 through 2014-15

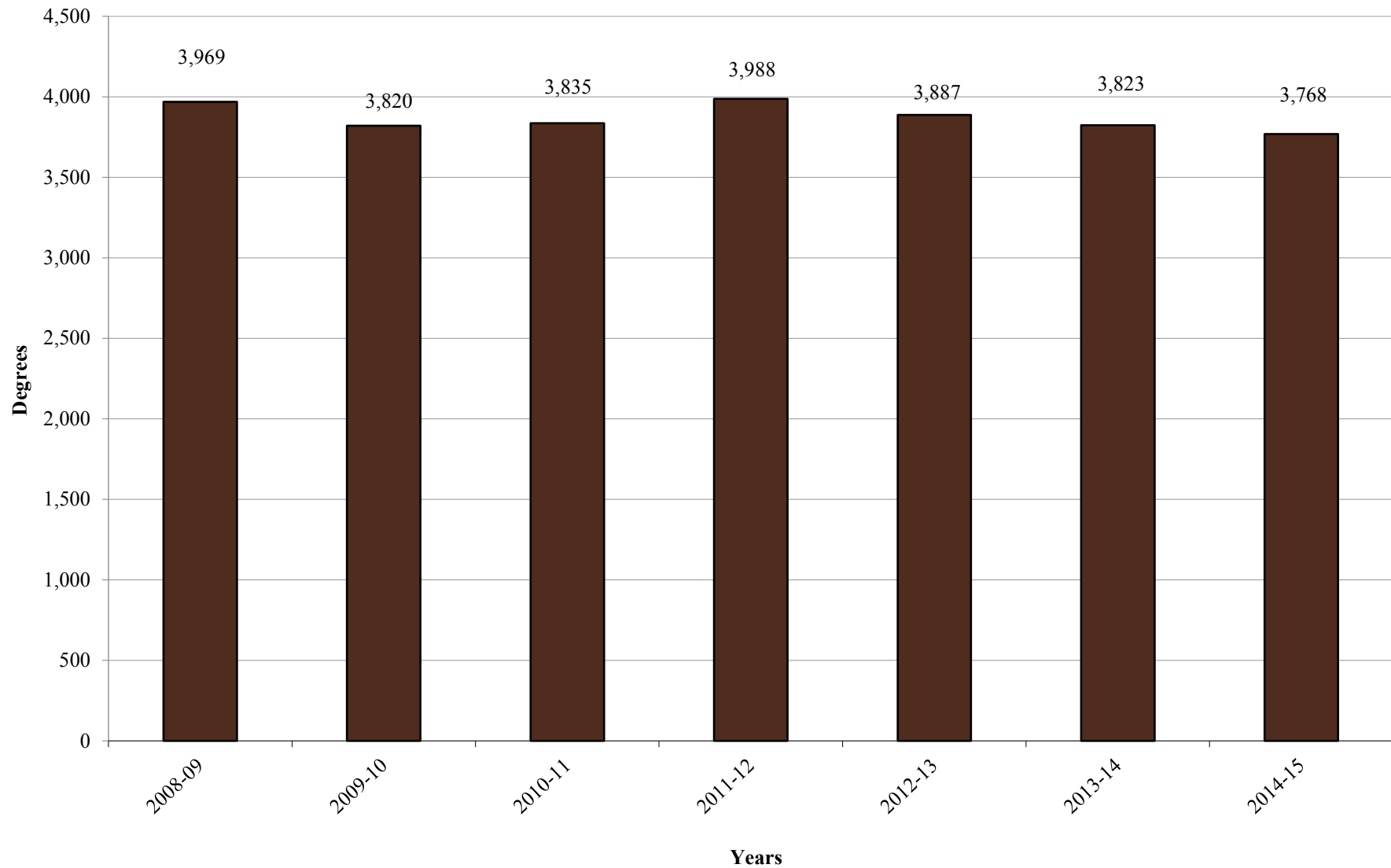

Fiscal Years 2008-09 through 2014-15

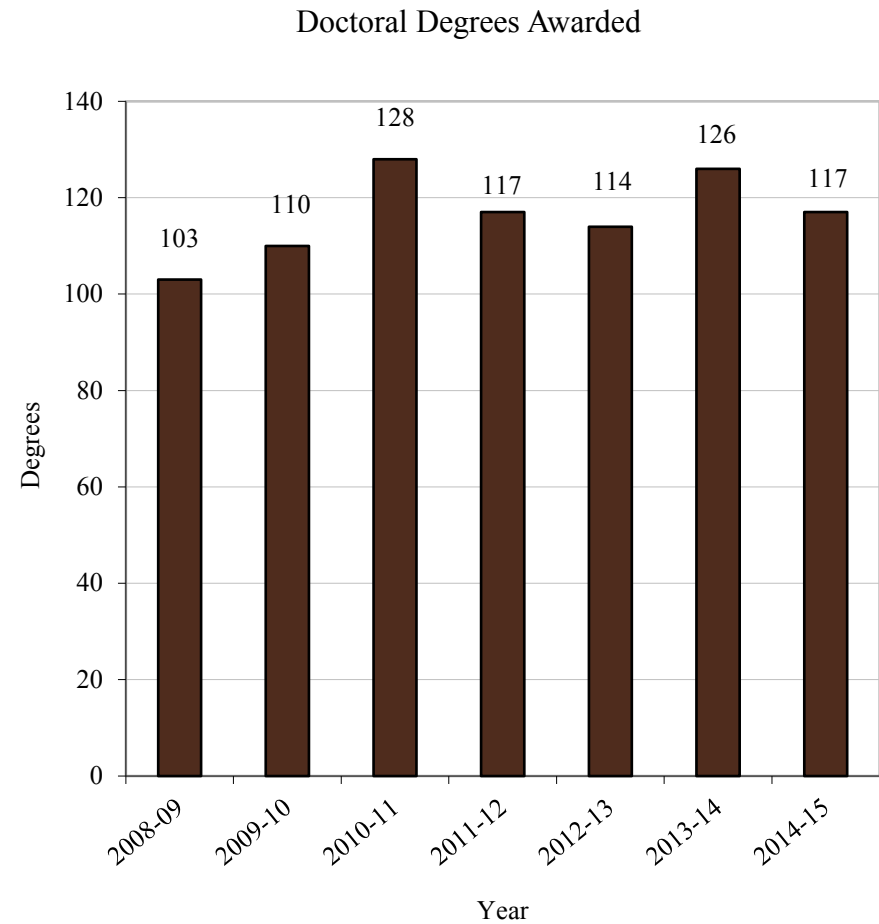
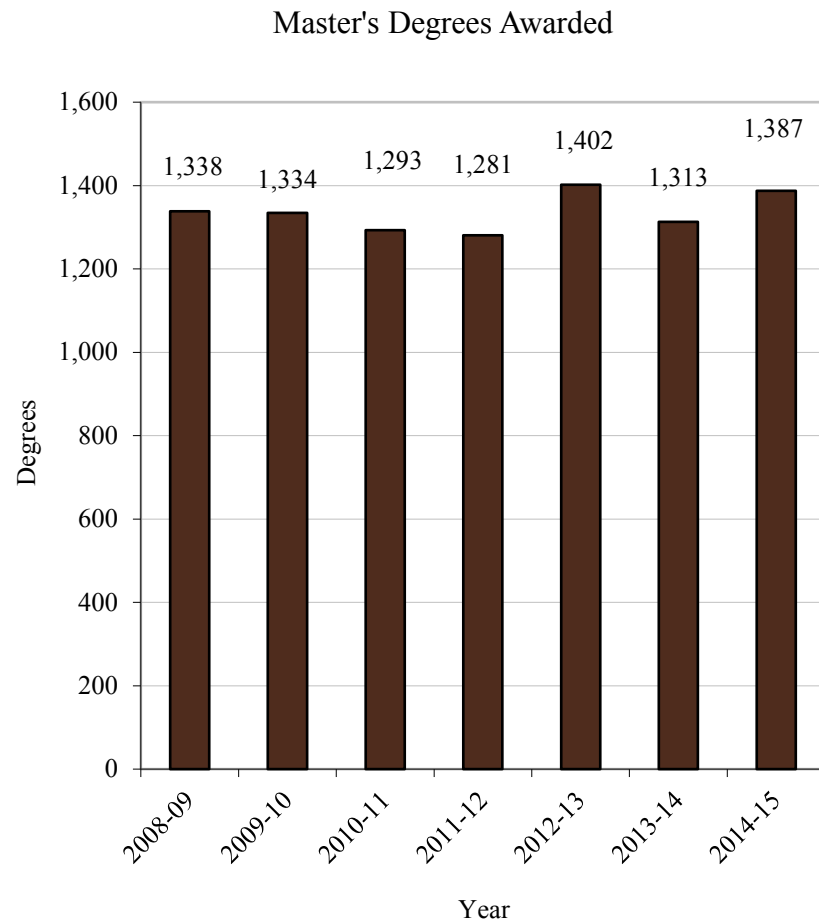

Fiscal Year 2014-15

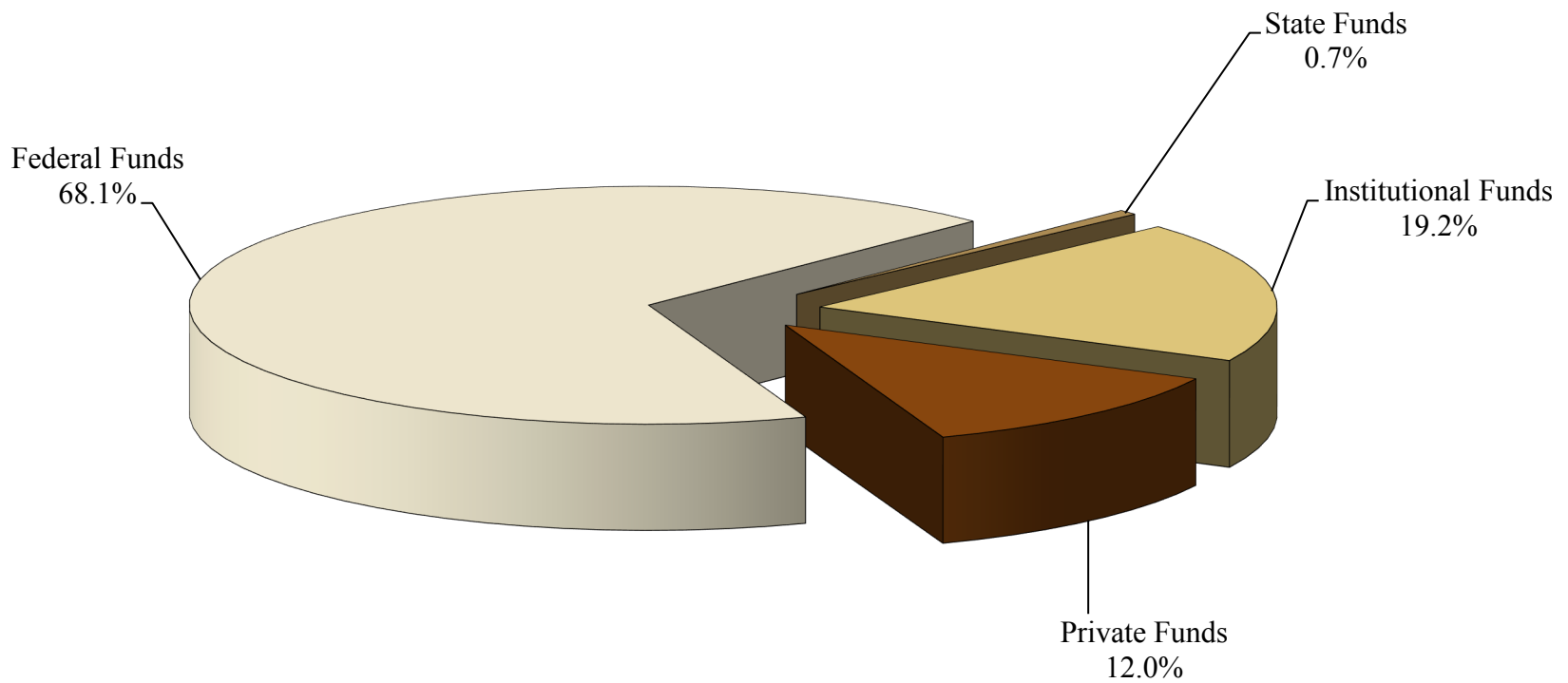

Fiscal Years 2010-11 through 2014-15

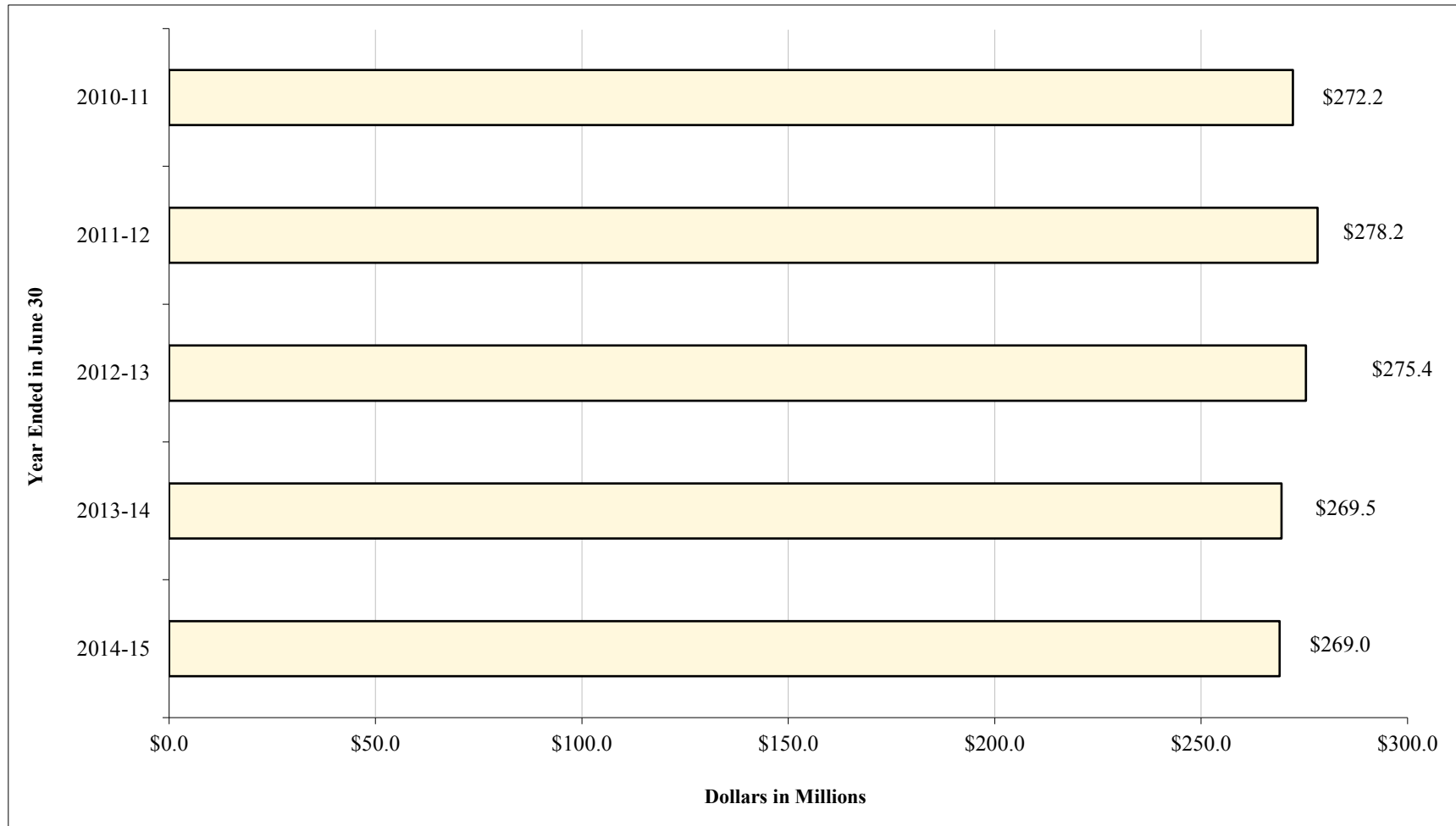
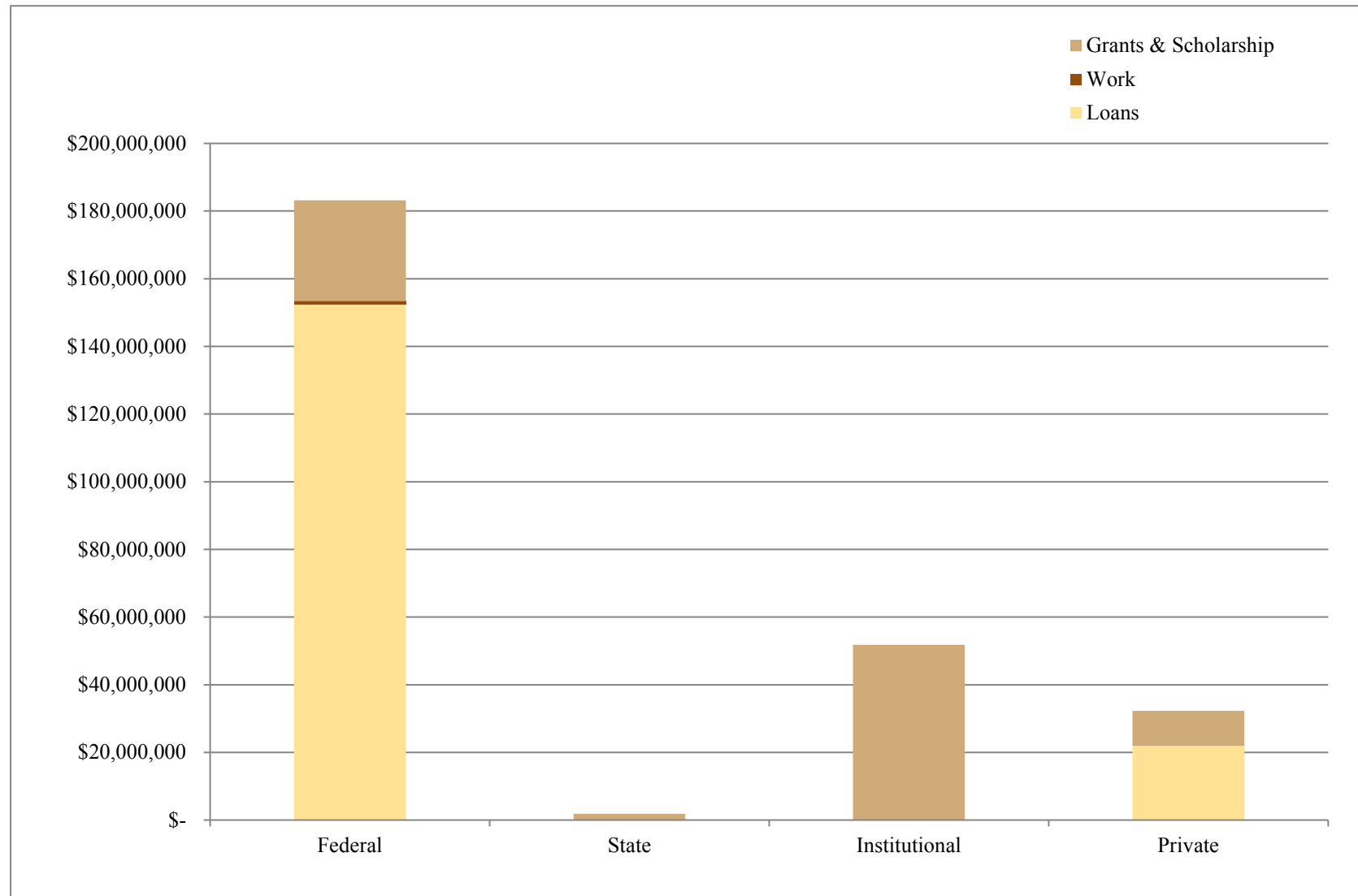

FACULTY DATA DEFINITIONS

Faculty Data: The tables and graphs in this section of the fact book contain information about WMU faculty. Several of the tables provide faculty headcounts based on different categorizations.

For general purposes, the University describes its faculty number as 946 regular and 494 part-time. Other groupings of faculty represented in the following tables are described below:

American Association of University Professors (AAUP) Reports: Each year, the University participates in a national study of the salaries of full-time instructional faculty prepared by the American Association of University Professors. The data are prepared in compliance with the definitions supplied by the National AAUP. Data from this study are compiled in Table 35.

Bargaining Unit Faculty: The AAUP represents 895 board-appointed ranked faculty as of Fall 2015. This number includes ranked faculty in the library, academic affairs, the Center for English Language and Culture for International Students, and Sindecuse Health Center. Administrative positions, including department chairs and directors, are excluded from the bargaining unit. A specific listing of those included and excluded in the bargaining unit is provided in Article I of the contract between the AAUP and the University.

Term Appointment: Term appointment refers to a board-appointed faculty position represented by the AAUP that has a specific duration, usually one year. A person in such a position is not eligible for tenure.

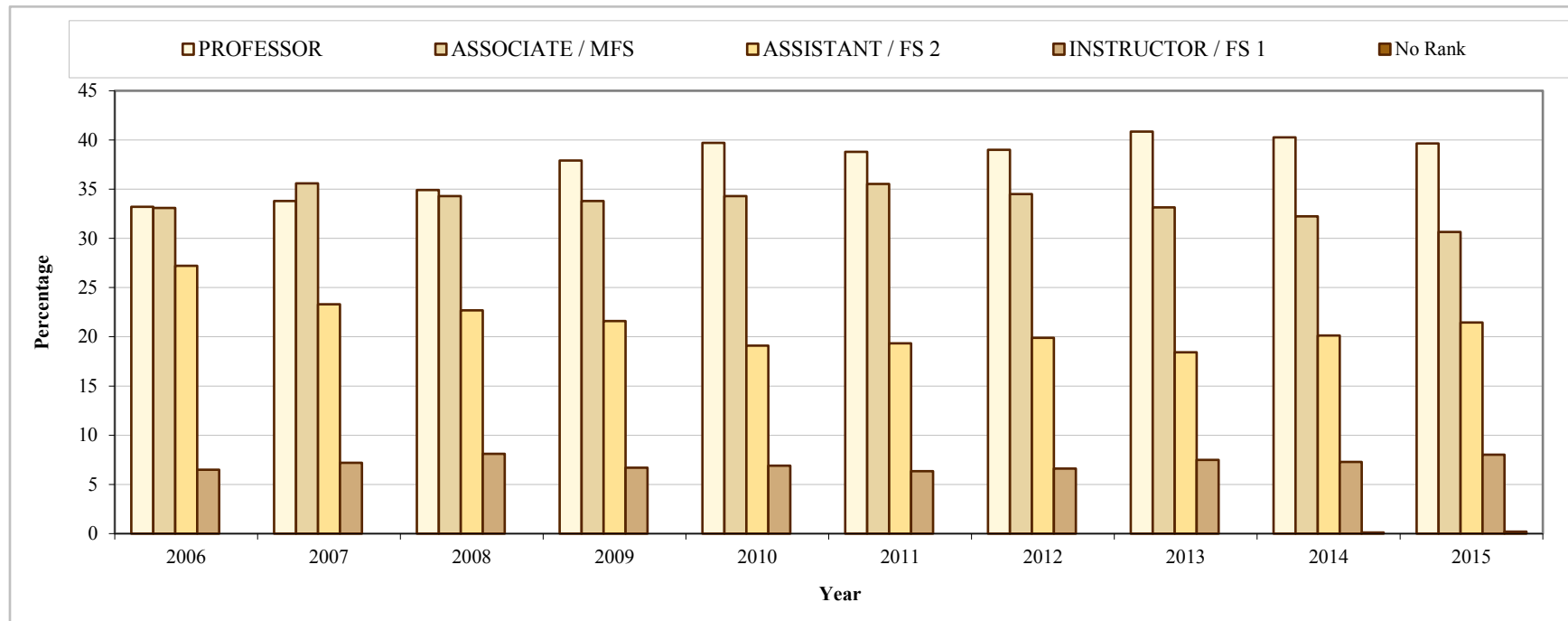
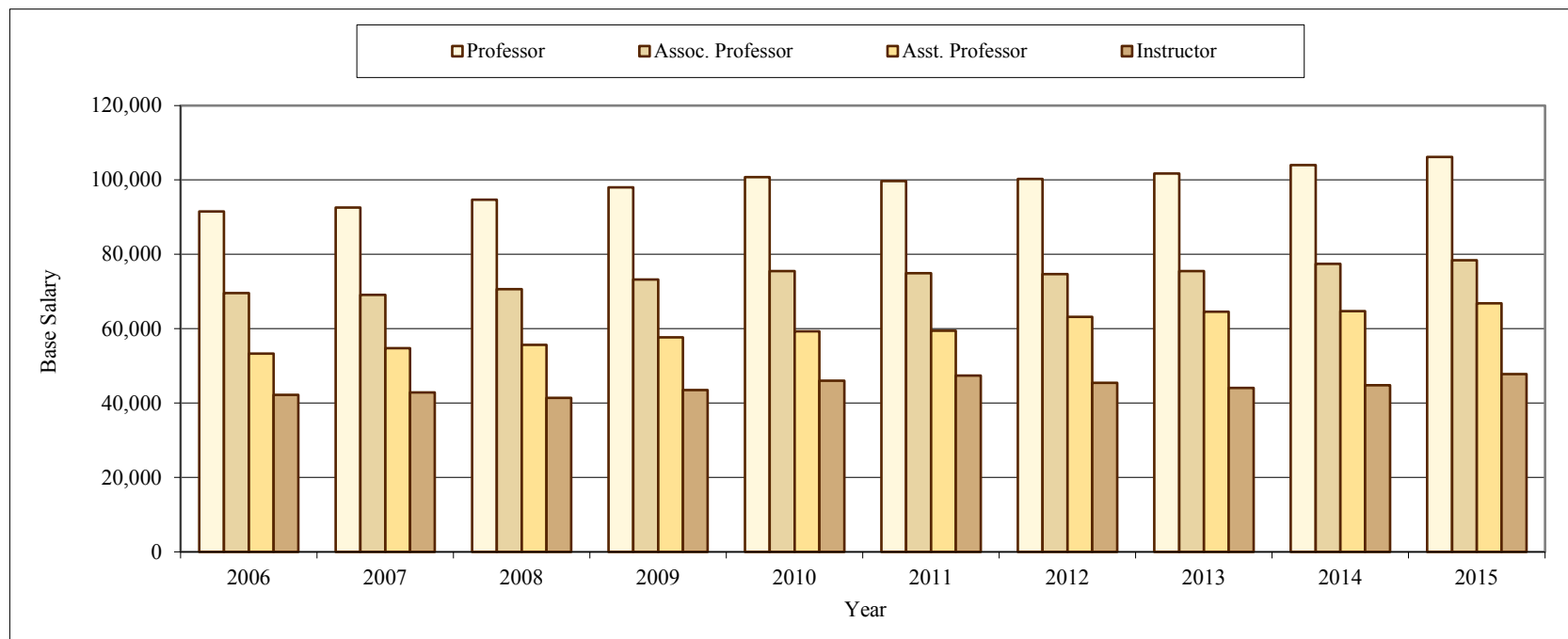

CURRENT FUND REVENUE

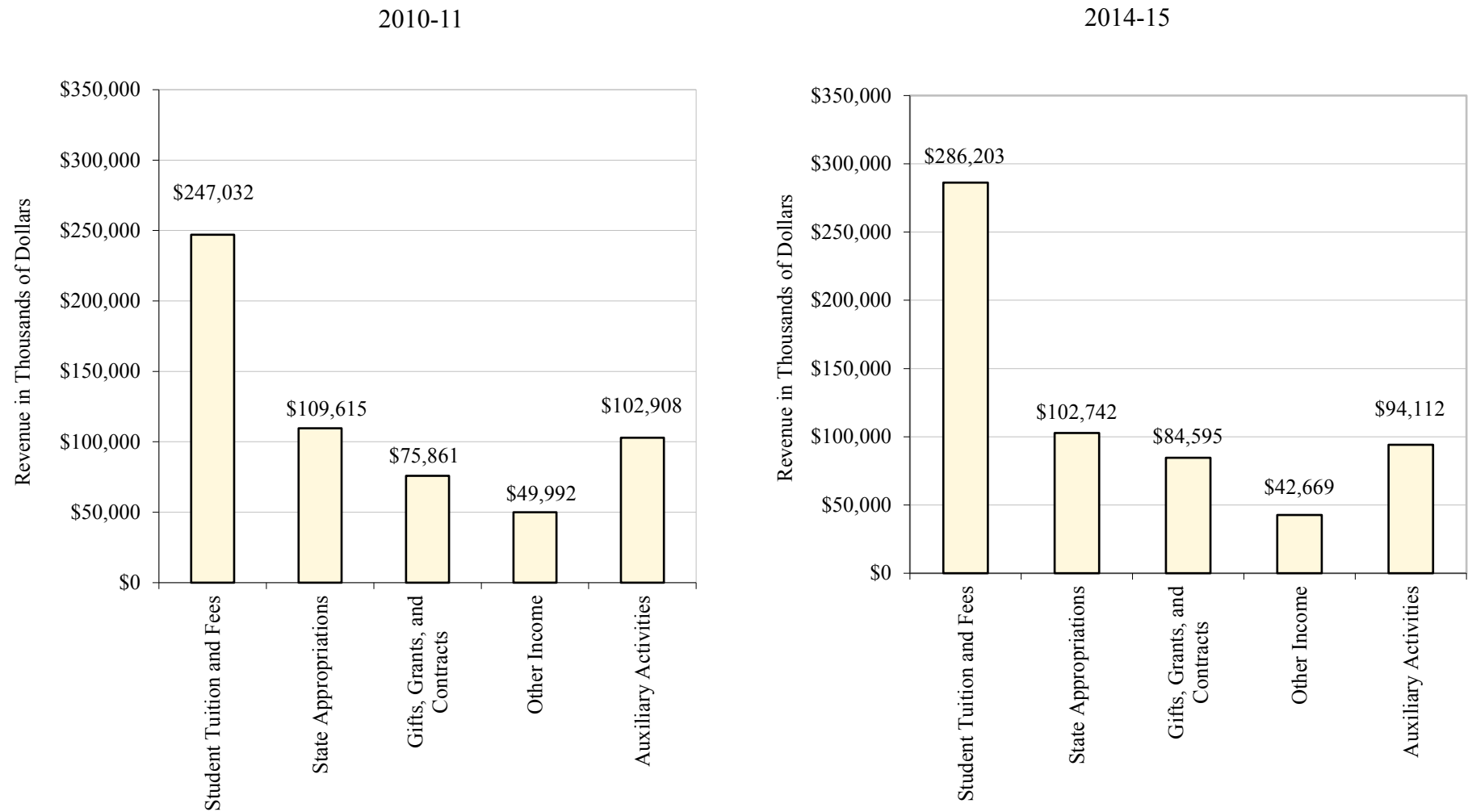

CURRENT FUND EXPENDITURES (IN THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS)

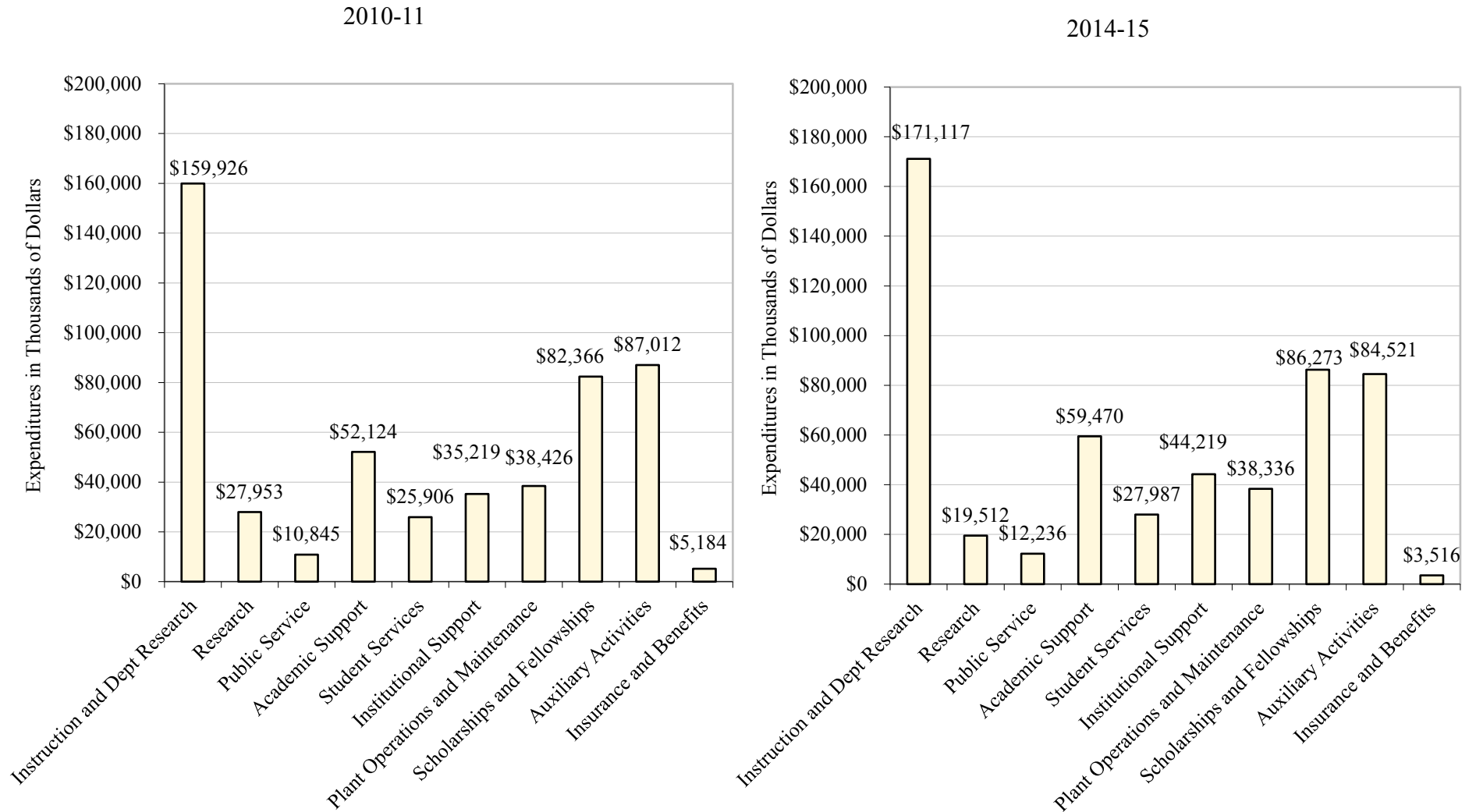

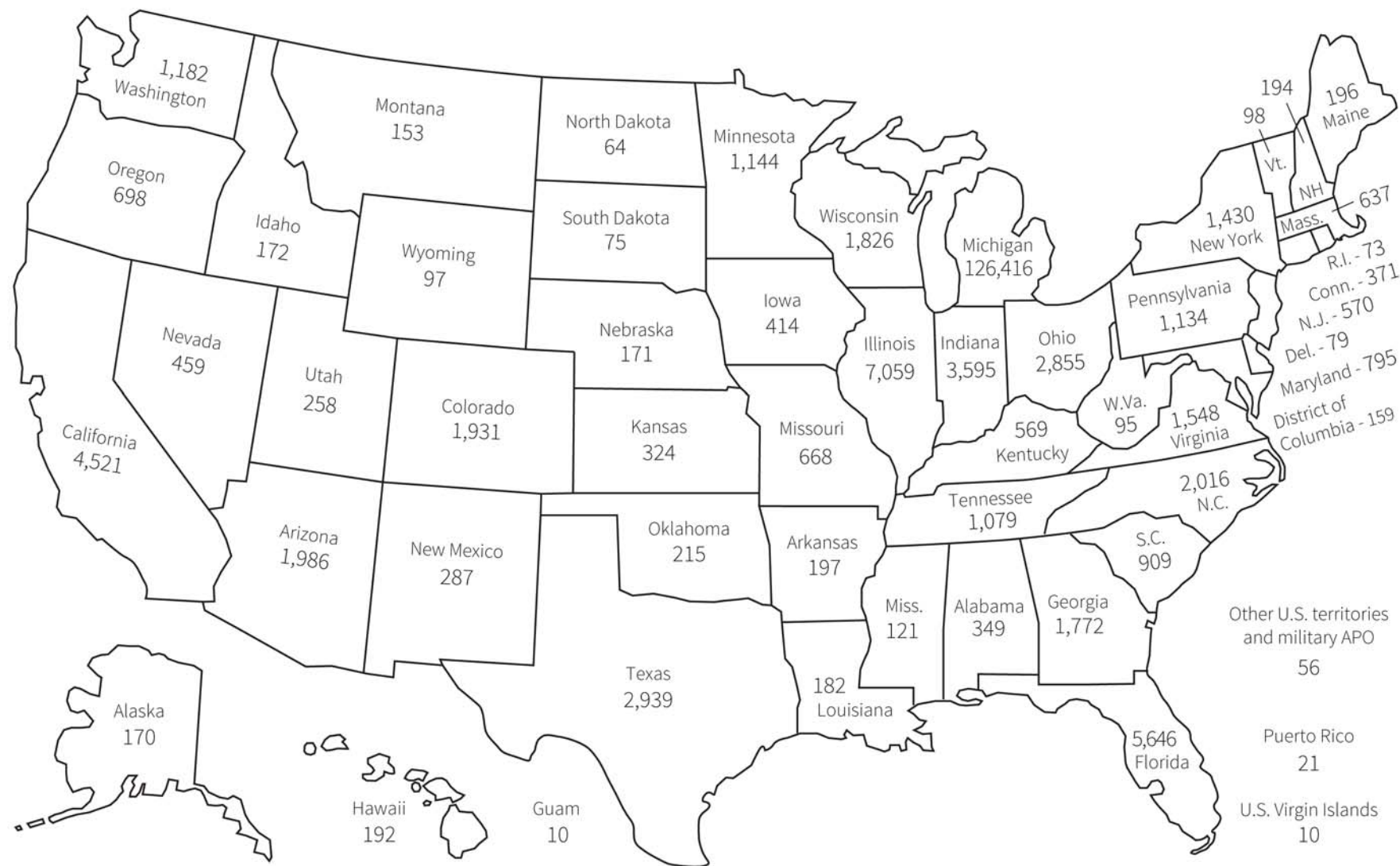

Alumni Geographic Distribution (2016)

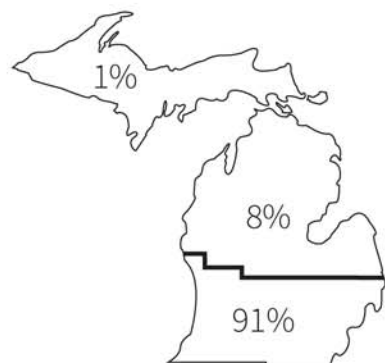

About 73 percent of all WMU alumni (180,188) live in the United States.

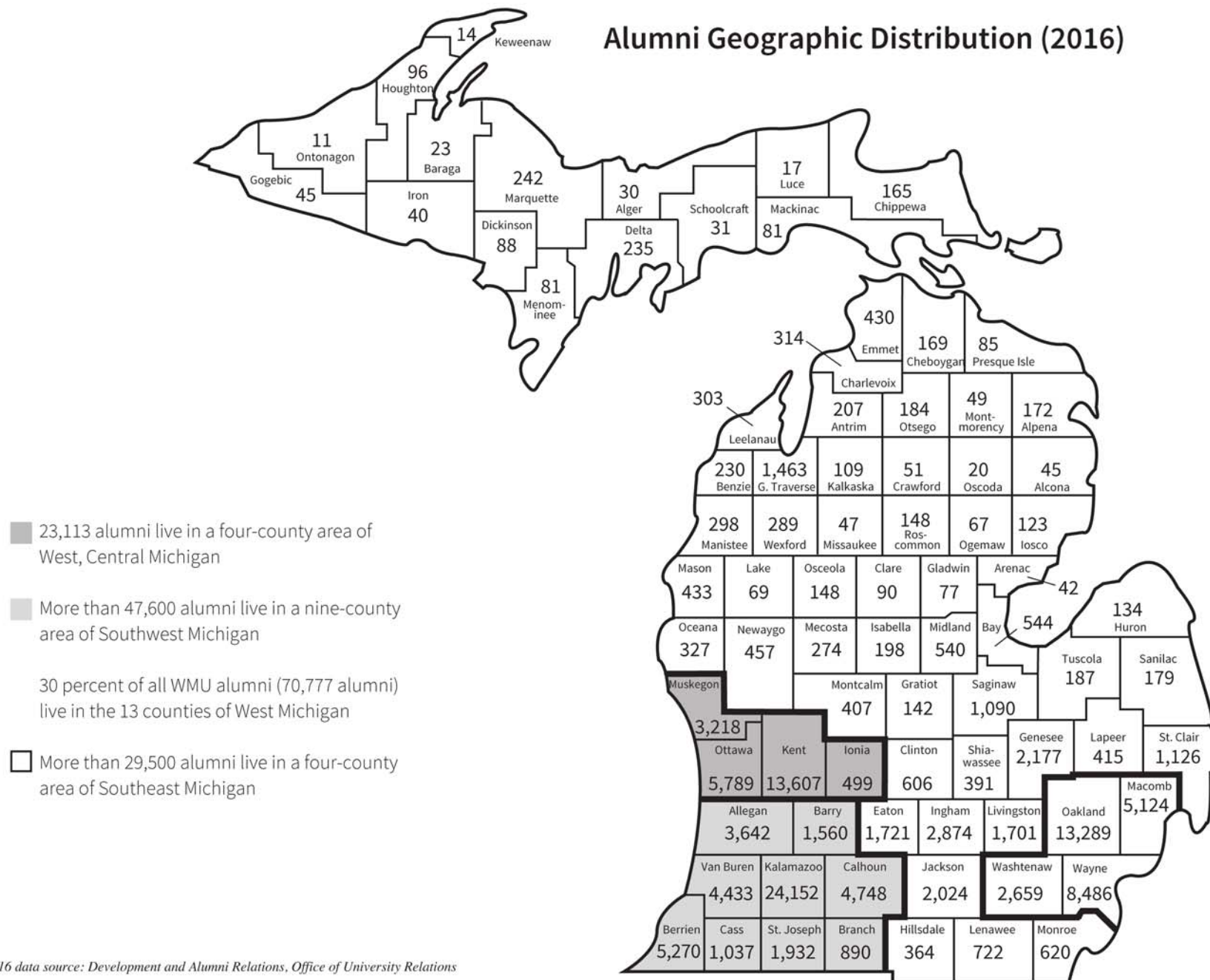
The largest populations of WMU alumni outside the United States are in Malaysia (over 1,600), India (892), Japan (619), Canada (471), China (400) and Thailand (464). Of the 180,188 alumni who live in the U.S., about 141,751 live in Michigan and the four surrounding states. This includes Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana, and Ohio.

There are 126,416 WMU alumni in Michigan. 51 percent of all WMU alumni live in Michigan. More than 91 percent of Michigan's WMU alumni live in the Lower Peninsula, south of a line extending from Muskegon County in the west to St. Clair County in the east.



*Verifiable, living alumni, includes both those who earned degrees at Western Michigan University and some former students who did not earn degrees. The WMU definition for “non-graduate alumni” has varied over the years. The alumni population is continually changing. Within one year of this report, actual alumni counts may vary by plus or minus 20 percent of the figures presented here. Population relationships and ratios are less likely to vary significantly.

2010-11 through 2014-15

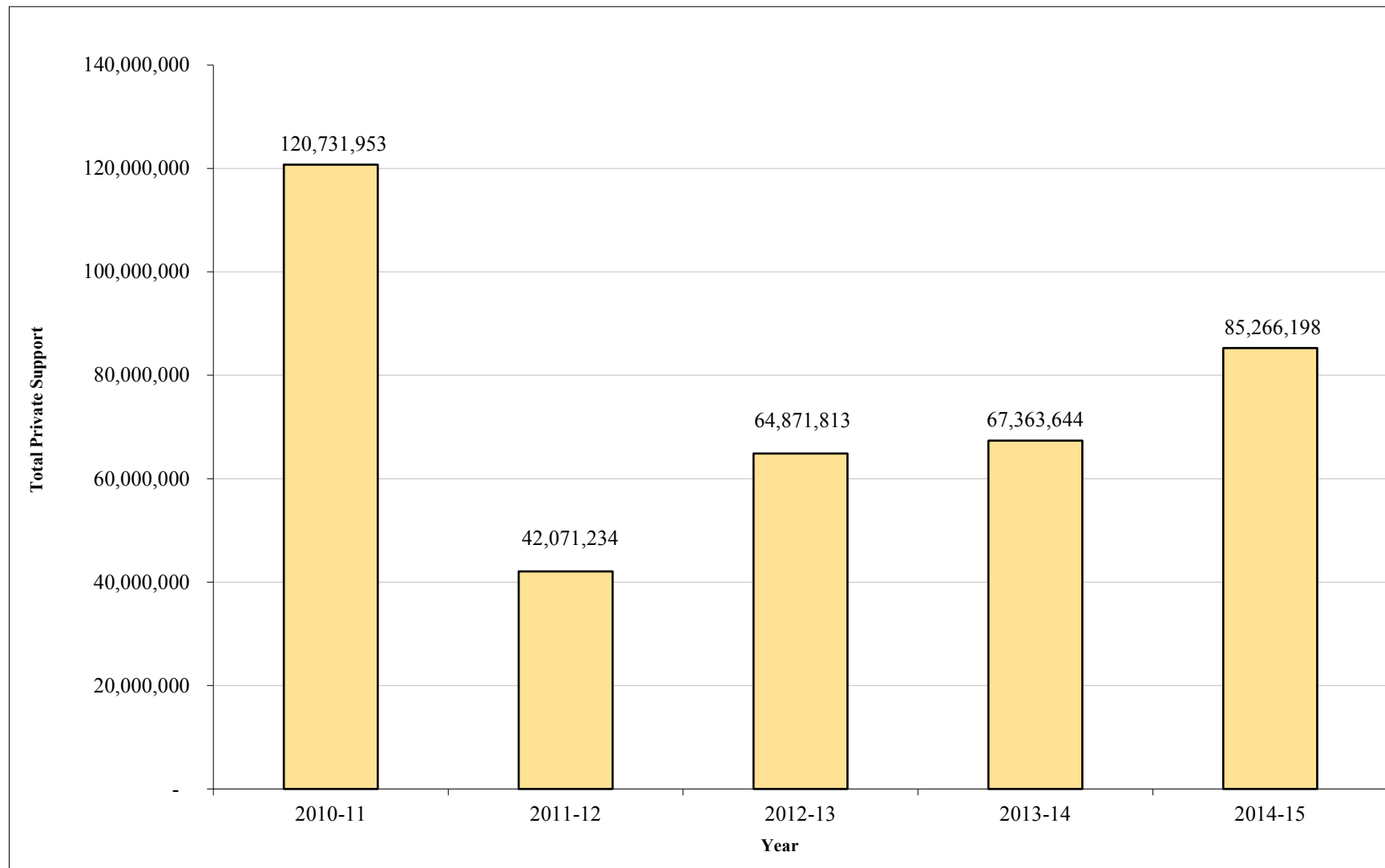
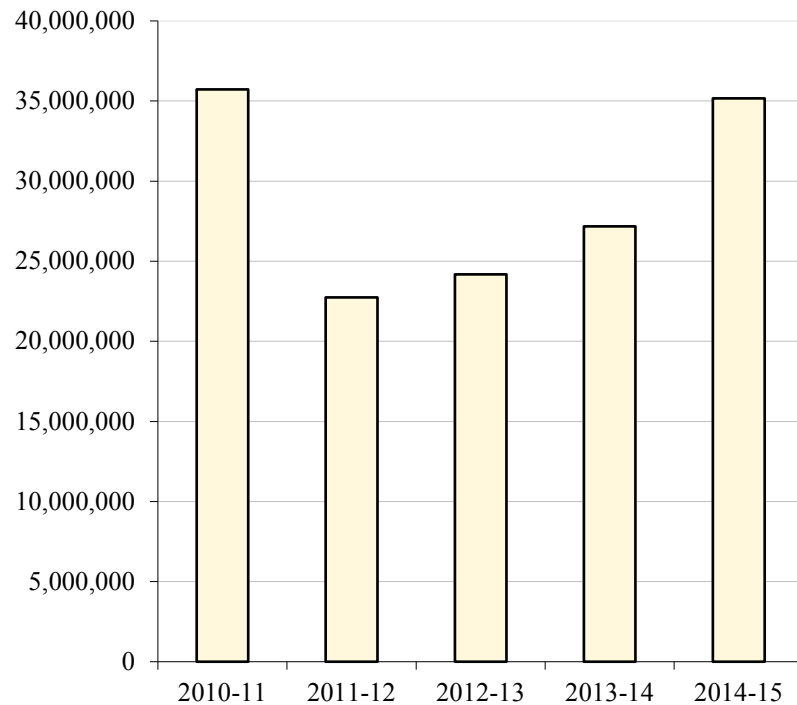
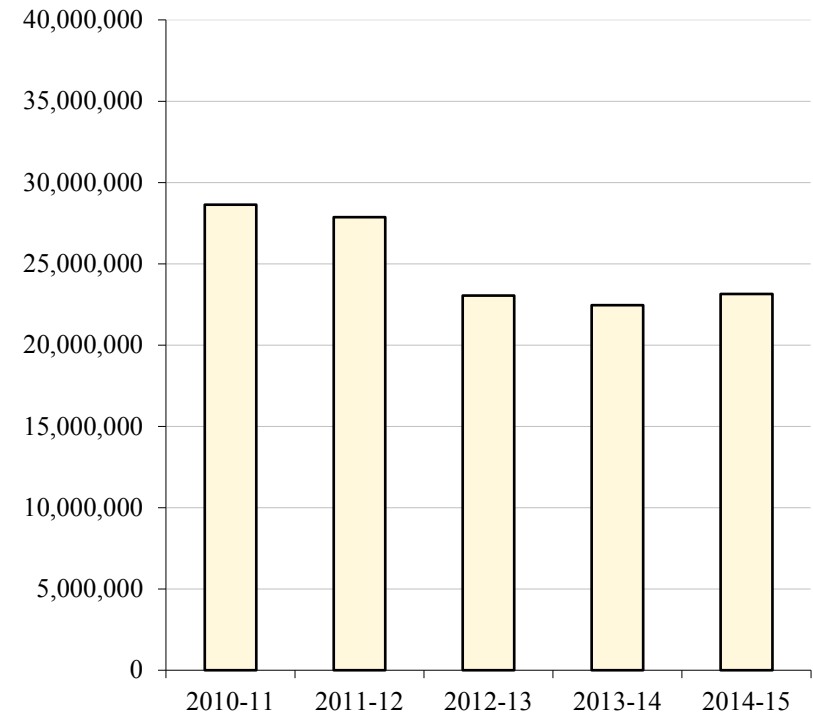
